Beast Butler was as happy yesterday as a dunghill rooster. He was duly inaugurated Governor of the State of Massachusetts.

Mr. H. A. Gudger, for six years past Principal of the Institute for the Deaf and Dumb and the Blind, at Raleigh, has resigned to take charge of the Warm Springs property, in which he is interested.

The Legislature was organized yesterday and was fairly at work to-day. Mr. Geo. M. Rose, of Fayetteville, was elected Speaker of the House.

Within the two last fiscal years 1,189 grants have been issued, covering 122,915 acres of vacant public land, lying chiefly in the extreme eastern and western counties.

The Secretary specially requests the General Assembly to provide additional legislation by which offenders against the insurance law may be punished, the present law having been found insufficient by the courts.

Dr. Worth's report is also very interesting. It covers fully the operations of the Treasury department during the past two years. We quote:

The authority to compromise the State debt under the act of 1879, expired on January 1, 1882, and since then nothing has been done in that matter.

compromised the 4 per cent bonded debt would be increased to \$3,589,571.25, the interest on which would be \$143,582; at present the interest charge for this debt is \$104,025. There is another class of bonds known as the North Carolina Railroad construction bonds, of which \$2,795,000 were outstanding.

The ordinary expenses of the government for 1882 and 1883, being legislative years, are estimated at \$544,000—for 1884 \$580,000. The taxation required to meet this, as we understand it, need not be greater than 28 cents on the \$100 worth of property, together with the other present sources of income.

There was a balance in the treasury October 1, 1882, of \$286,455, of which \$32,265 belonged to the educational fund and \$254,189 belonged to the general fund.

Board of Alderman. The Board of Aldermen met in regular session at the City Hall last night. Committee on Lights were granted further time.

Committee on Fire Department were granted further time on petition of the Phoenix Fire Engine Company, to report fully upon the necessities of the matter.

The Mayor announced the appointment of Dr. F. W. Potter as Superintendent of Health, to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Dr. Walker. The action of the Mayor was approved.

A communication was received from the Board of Audit and Finance asking the committee on Fire Department to report as to the necessity of the two hydrants ordered for Nutt street; also, referring bill of J. G. Norwood back to the Board.

A petition for a fire hydrant at the corner of Sixth and Princess streets was referred to committee on Water Works. The annual report of R. J. Jones, Esq., commissioner of the Sinking Fund of the city, was received, read and ordered on file. The following is the report.

OFFICE BOARD AUDIT AND FINANCE. January 2, 1883.

To the Honorable the Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Wilmington: GENTLEMEN—As required by law, I herewith submit statement, showing the condition of the Sinking Fund of your city:

Securities Held—Of Maturity Bonds \$1,700,000; Of Bonds Maturing Feb. 1, 1892, 3,000; Of Bonds Maturing Jan. 1, 1897, 3,700; Of Bonds Maturing Jan. 1, 1899, 1,000; Of Bonds Maturing Jan. 1, 1901, 10,000; Of Bonds Maturing Jan. 1, 1904, 25,000; Cash Uninvested, 29.

The value of maintaining this fund as an important factor in sustaining our city credit is fully recognized by every one who deals in our city securities, or is at all interested in the good faith of the city toward its creditors, as it forms a part of the contract under which our bonds were issued. For it must be borne in mind, that the several acts of the Legislature authorizing the city to issue bonds, provided for the creation and maintenance of a Sinking Fund for their gradual payment.

Richard J. Jones, Commissioner Sinking Fund. Petition of J. W. Taylor, to erect a saw and planing mill on the site of the mill recently destroyed by fire, was referred to Committee on Fire Department, with power to act.

Reports from the Superintendent of Health and Chief of the Fire Department were received and ordered filed. Alderman Worth offered the following resolution, which was adopted: Resolved, That the Mayor appoint a committee of three members of this Board, the Mayor being one, whose duty it shall be to take such proceedings as may be requisite in their opinion, to effect any legislation that may be necessary to enable the city to utilize its market houses and regulate its markets, and also to adopt and authenticate a copy of the original plan of the town of Wilmington, the original plan having been lost.

The Mayor said that he would appoint at some future time and notify the committee. A communication was received from Dr. Thomas relative to the city pound and cattle yard.

On motion of Alderman Huggins the communication was referred to a special committee of three, the Mayor being one, to take the matter into consideration and report at the next meeting. The Mayor appointed on said committee Aldermen Bowden and Huggins. Adjourned.
