THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

SENATE.

FIFTH DAY.

MONDAY, JANUARY 8, 1883.

Mr. Clarke, bill to protect marble workers and stone cutters. (Authorizes them to take a lien on all work done on monuments and grave-stones.)

Mr. Black—Bill to make the crime of assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill, or assault and battery with a deadly weapon with intent to kill, a felony punishable by imprisonment in the State prison.

Mr. Cozart—Resolution requesting our representatives and instructing our Senators in Congress to use their best efforts to obtain a return of the money collected by a direct tax from the citizens of North Carolina in 1865.

Mr. Lyon—Bill incorporating the Grand Council of the American Legion of Honor of North Carolina, and subordinate councils working under the jurisdiction of said Grand Council.

Mr. Ebbs—Bill making dogs the subjects of felony, regardless of taxation.

Mr. Scott, of Rockingham, from the special committee on the tariff and internal revenue, submitted a majority report on Mr. Payne's resolution to our Congressmen relating to tariff and revenue embracing in substance the original and recommending its favorable consideration.

Mr. Strayhorn, of the committee, gave notice that on to-morrow he would present a minority report.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. By Mr. Sherrill—Resolution instructing our members of Congress to have the election law changed.

The following bills were introduced, passed their first reading and were appropriately referred, as follows: By Mr. Forbis, bill to abolish the office of county treasurer.

By Mr. Powers, of Cumberland, bill relative to carrying concealed weapons; repealing chapter 127, laws 1873.

By Mr. Simmons, a bill to make justices of the peace eligible to the office of county commissioner.

By Mr. Stanford, a bill to elect county tax collectors.

By Mr. Harris, of Davidson, a bill to repeal the merchants' license tax.

By Mr. March, a bill relative to official advertising.

By Mr. Powers, of Cumberland, a bill to amend an act to prevent the sale of liquor on Sunday.

By Mr. Cowell, a bill to prevent the erection of artificial islands in the navigable waters of the State.

By Mr. Proctor, a bill to protect fish in Columbus and Robeson counties.

By the same, a bill to prevent the sale of liquors in one mile of Long Branch Church, in Robeson county.

By Mr. Speller, bill to prohibit the working of female convicts on certain public works.

By Mr. Newell, bill concerning "Big Swamp," Bladen county.

By Mr. Page, bill to establish a standard weight for a barrel of pork.

On motion the rules were suspended and the resolution put on its passage. Adopted.
