Something over 2,500 new buildings were erected in New York last year. Hundreds of these were flats and tenement houses, costing among the hundreds of thousands of dollars each.

Fanny Fair says that a Colonel in the Guards, who was under fire for just five minutes, has got for it the Order of the Bath, a Turkish order, and the English and Egyptian war medals.

The 88th anniversary of the battle of New Orleans was celebrated in Boston by a dinner given by the Democratic State Executive Committee in honor of Butler's inauguration as Governor.

The foundation stone of the magnificent Church of the Saviour at Vienna, which has been under construction for twenty-six years, and is the expression of a national thanksgiving for the preservation of a monarch's life, is a block of marble, quarried on the Mount of Olives, Jerusalem.

The Warden of the Illinois penitentiary has collected figures as death rate in penal institutions, and astonishing variations are shown. While at Sing Sing the yearly deaths from 1,000 inmates number less than seven, at Auburn they are twelve, and at Clinton over twenty. The lowest rate is three in Wisconsin, and the highest is seventy seven in Mississippi.

Yesterday morning, at 7 o'clock, the thermometer at the Signal office here registered 44.5 degrees and at the same hour this morning it was down to 29, a difference in twenty-four hours of 15.5 degrees.
