SENATE.

SEVENTH DAY. WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 10. Mr. Speight—bill to exempt farming implements and mechanical tools from taxation.

Mr. Scott, of New Hanover—Resolution instructing the Attorney-General to bring an action in the proper court to inquire by what right the Seaboard & Roanoke Railroad Company hold stock in the Carolina Central Railroad Company.

Mr. Mebane's bill, putting a fine of \$500 upon all parties who buy or sell a pistol, bow-knife, dirk, dagger, stilet, slung shot, loaded cane, sword-cane, brass, iron or metallic knucks, upon its second reading was placed upon the table.

Bill to extend the jurisdiction of justices of the peace, giving them authority to try larceny cases where the value of articles stolen did not exceed one dollar, was put upon its second reading.

Mr. Scott, of New Hanover, the introducer of the bill, in urging its passage, cited cases where counties were put to much cost in bringing parties to trial for stealing watermelons, apples and various other small things, and that in one case a man was sent to the penitentiary for stealing a Bible, and urged the passage of the bill.

Mr. Dortch asked Mr. Scott if he desired to give magistrates the power to send criminals to the penitentiary, and stated that his bill would have that effect.

The bill was tabled. Bill to amend chapter 282 of the laws of 1881, concerning the protection of fish in Lumber river and its tributaries, was amended, passed its several readings and was ordered engrossed.

Mr. Mebane's bill fixing a penalty of \$3,000 upon all persons who ship lumber in logs from this State to any other State or Territory by rail or otherwise was laid upon the table.

Mr. Lyon, bill in regard to lands belonging to the board of education in Bladen county. Education. By the same, bill to prescribe the fees of clerks of the Superior Court for recording and Register of Deeds for recording chattel mortgages.

Mr. Clark, resolution requesting the Treasurer to inform the Senate whether the five hundred and fifty thousand dollars of the first mortgage bonds of the Western North Carolina railroad have been deposited in the Treasury.

By the same, bill to fix the time at which the value of the property wrongfully taken shall be assessed.

Mr. Hill, regarding the sale or giving away of spirituous liquors at places where political speakings are held.

Mr. Ebbas, bill in regard to allowing commissioners to place the names of all of them on the jury box, Judiciary.

By the same, bill disallowing the registers of deeds any fees except mileage and per diem while acting as clerk ex officio to the board of county commissioners. Salaries and fees.

Mr. Scott, of Rockingham, resolution suggesting to the committee on finance certain changes in the manner now in force of collecting merchants' tax, which was adopted.

Upon Mr. Jones' motion the rules were suspended and the report of the committee on privileges and elections in regard to the contested case between Halstead and Woodhouse was taken up. The committee unanimously reported by resolution that Mr. J. M. Woodhouse, Democrat, was entitled to the seat in the Senate as Senator from the first district instead of Mr. Halstead, Republican, who held the seat by a certificate from that district.

The resolution was adopted—all the Senators present voting for it except Mr. Scott, of New Hanover, who voted against it.

STATE NEWS.

Charlotte Journal: Our county has just lost one of its most useful citizens in the death of Mr Mark A Wilson, of Berryhill township, who was called to his reward yesterday morning about 6 o'clock.

The First National Bank of Charlotte, the capital stock of which is \$400,000, will for the present retire \$100,000 of its capital, in order that a better dividend may be paid to the stockholders.

Weldon News: Silas Hines, colored, who about four years ago killed his father-in-law in Wayne county and made his escape, was caught here on Monday by policeman Roberts.

Our merchants and business men complain of dull times. The weather and consequently the roads also, have been so bad for the past few weeks that trade has been small. Even on Saturdays, which are usually busy days, there is but little done.

Clinton Caucasian: Rev. John W. Bell, living and farming on Dr. Almon Holmes' plantation near this place, made last year with one horse and two little boys, paying out for labor in cultivating and housing a crop only about \$30, eight bales of cotton, averaging 550 pounds each after paying toll, about 60 barrels of corn, 6000 pounds of fodder, saved thirty bushels clean peas, 175 bushels sweet potatoes, and will kill from 2,000 to 2,500 pounds of good pork.

Goldboro Messenger: Goldboro contains five papers, four churches and a flourishing graded school. The Kingston Collegiate Institute which had enrolled during the Fall term 189 pupils, has been changed into a Graded School and the number of pupils have increased to nearly 200.

Charlotte Observer: The snow storm which visited us night before last, was considered to be a pretty lively one, but it was not a circumstance compared to the storm that raged from High Point to Richmond at High Point the snow fell to the depth of 31 inches on a level; at Danville it was 25 inches and from there on to Richmond the depth increased about three inches.
