The Small Pox.

Dr. F. W. Potter, City Superintendent of Health, has been in correspondence with the Mayor of Wilson, relative to the prevalence of small-pox reported in that city. The correspondence was official and was directed by Mayor Smith. It was ascertained that but two cases of the disease had appeared in Wilson during the last three weeks and that these are now quarantined in a hospital two or three miles from the city limits. Dr. Potter will keep thoroughly informed as to the progress of the disease elsewhere and will be careful in seeing that all sanitary precautions necessary are carefully observed.

Settled With the Treasurer.

Exports Foreign.

Nor. barque *Emity*, Capt. Larsen, cleared to-day for Liverpool with 1,305 bales of cotton, valued at \$64,758, shipped by Mr. Eugene McDonnell. Nor. barque *Kleanor*, Capt. Neilsen, cleared to-day for Hull, Eng., with 825 barrels rosin and 1,300 barrels of tar, valued at \$4,026, shipped by Messrs. Robinson & King. Haytian brig *Dauphin*, Capt. Prentz, cleared to-day for Port-au-Prince, Hayti, with 68,930 feet of lumber, valued at \$1,255.08, shipped by Messrs. Northrop & Cumming.

Legislative Locals.

In the Senate, yesterday, Mr. Scott, of New Hanover, desired to change his vote on the Halstead and Woodhouse contested election case and to record it in the affirmative, seating Mr. Woodhouse, the Democratic contestant. After some discussion he was allowed to do so, and thus the vote was made unanimous.

Mr. Toon introduced a bill to incorporate the Southern Ore Company, of this city, and it was referred to committee on corporations.

Mr. Boykin introduced a bill to amend the charter of the town of Clifton, which was referred to committee on corporations.

The bill for the relief of the administrators of the Sheriff of Columbus county passed its third reading and was ordered engrossed.

Bill to authorize Pender county to issue bonds to build a court house, jail, &c., passed second reading.

In the House the substitute for the bill to compel the Carolina Central R. R. to keep lights on "their" bridge over the Cape Fear river, above Wilmington, passed its third reading. There is no indication as yet as to what this substitute is.

A Fine Steamer.

The steamer *City of Jacksonville*, Captain W. A. Shaw, from Wilmington, Del., for Jacksonville, Fla., arrived in at Smithville last night and came up to the city this morning for a supply of coal. She is one of a line, consisting of seven first class steamers, to be run as freight and passenger boats on the St. John's river, and is one of the most thoroughly equipped and elegantly furnished river steamers we have ever seen. Her state rooms, of which there are thirty-eight, are fitted with every appliance of ease and comfort; her main saloon, which is very large and commodious, is carpeted throughout its entire length and breadth with rich and heavy carpeting, and is supplied with easy chairs, mirrors and in fact everything else to make a river passage agreeable and pleasant. The dining room, pantry and kitchen are marvels of neatness, convenience and comfort, while the quarters of the men and rooms of the officers could not be improved upon. The captain's room is just abaft the pilot house, into which it opens, so that he can lie in his berth and hear every signal of the different bells and can tell by the tone with whom the pilot is communicating.

The *City of Jacksonville* is 300 tons burthen and is now in material and machinery, it having all been built during the year just passed. In her construction thoroughness in every detail was the all-important aim in view. Although built expressly for river navigation she stood the rough seaweather of the last few days, on her passage out, remarkably well, and very much better than might reasonably have been expected. She has had heavy easterly gales to contend with ever since she left the Capes of the Delaware, which has made her passage slow and tedious. It is impossible, with the limited space at our command, to give more than an outline of the many points of interest in this splendid steamer. To Captain Shaw, her commander, we are under many obligations for courtesies extended and we wish that he may "live long and prosper" and that the *City of Jacksonville* may be fortunate and profitable under his command.

A Man-of-War's Man.

We have received a dispatch from Flemington, N. C., stating that the United States steamer *Little Jack* had arrived off that port and was now at anchor in Waccamaw Lake just out of range of the guns of the fort. She is reported to have a party of United States engineers on board and arrived by the way of Waccamaw river. It was feared that the gallant craft would meet with resistance on her passage up the river, but it seems that the natives did not molest her, preferring that she should be allowed to penetrate as far as navigation would permit so that she would become an easier victim should circumstances warrant her capture. A meeting of the citizens was called promptly upon her arrival, and Col. H. B. Short was appointed a commissioner on the part of the government to go on board and demand her immediate and unconditional surrender or be prepared to accept the awful consequences. We are happy to state that his mission was entirely successful and the result was obtained without the loss of a man and that no enemy now menaces the peace, happiness, prosperity and glory of Columbus county in general and Flemington in particular.
