Dayton, Ohio, is to organize a company with \$1,000,000 capital to carry on a slate mining enterprise in Craig county, Va.

The splendidly paved streets of Washington have suggested the use there of tricycles by the mail carriers. The experiment will be tried.

New York is talking about a new aqueduct to cost \$14,000,000. If it makes progress like the East River bridge, it will cost about thirty million before it is ready for use.

The State of Pennsylvania is asked to pay the county of Alleghany \$2,500,000 for property destroyed by the mob in 1877. The amount asked was \$4,000,000, which has been cut down to \$2,500,000.

Not much regard is paid to the observance of Sunday in some parts of Texas. Last Sunday night, despite the attempts to enforce the law, the Fay Templeton troupe played in the Opera House, which was crowded.

Senator Vance has discovered that there is a "religious element" in soap. A discovery, by the way, which was made more than two thousand years ago, that is if there is any truth in the saying that "cleanliness is next to godliness."

The combined wealth of the members of the California Senate is composed of four editors, eight farmers, one miner, four capitalists, two merchants, five mechanics, one contractor, one physician, one vinecultivist and four teen lawyers.

It is expected that the work of demolition at the Tuilleries will be begun before the end of the present month. The report of the Directors, made through their President, E. Burke Haywood, M. D., is confined principally to advice and suggestions for the attention of the legislature, and is an eminently practical and valuable paper. The report of the Superintendent, Dr. Eugene Grissom, gives a full and detailed account of the patients, the number admitted with the peculiar form of malady with which each patient is afflicted; the number discharged and the condition when discharged, and the number who have died with the immediate cause of death. It also gives a detailed account of the receipts and disbursements during the year, as well as the industries which have been pursued and the agricultural products of the grounds.

Death of Mr. Shackelford.

It is with deep regret that we learn of the death of Hon. Jno. W. Shackelford, Congressman from this district. He died in Washington City this morning, as we learn from a dispatch received here to-day by Mr. Edward A. Oldham. No particulars were contained in the dispatch beyond the fact of his death and we have presumed that he died this morning. He has been ill for about two weeks past and it is only of late that fears as to the result have been apprehended.

Mr. Shackelford was, we think, about 40 years of age, and was a native and resident of Onslow county. He was elected in 1880 to the term which will expire on the 4th of next March. He was a gentleman of many sterling qualities, staunch in his friendships, of sterling integrity in his official life and a gentleman of irreproachable private character.
