THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

SENATE.

THIRTEENTH DAY.

WEDNESDAY, January 17.

Mr Scott, of New Hanover, petition of citizens of Wilmington and New Hanover county, requesting that the justices of the peace of New Hanover county be allowed to deputize officers.

Mr McLean, petition of citizens of Robeson county concerning Bethesda Church in said county.

Mr Boykin, a bill to divide the State into nine Congressional districts. Referred to the committee on redistricting the State.

Mr Pool, a bill to provide for the erection of a residence for the Governor and rooms for the Supreme Court. Public grounds.

Mr Black, a bill relating to the law of attachments. Judiciary.

Mr Lyon, a bill to incorporate the North Carolina Life and Fire Insurance Company. Insurance.

Upon motion of Mr Strayhorn, the bill in regard to paying officers and witnesses when defendants are not convicted was recommended to the judiciary committee.

At 12 o'clock sharp the President announced that the Senate would go to the House of Representatives in a body, where the result of the vote for United States Senator would be announced.

The result, as stated by the two clerks, was: for Hon M W Ransom, in the Senate, 33 votes; in the House, 74 votes; making a total of 107 votes. For Colonel William Johnson, in the Senate, 19 votes; in the House 35 votes, making a total of 54 votes.

The speaker said inasmuch as Hon M W Ransom received a majority of votes as cast, according to the laws of the State of North Carolina he was declared elected to the office of United States Senator for the term beginning March 4, 1883, and ending March 4, 1889.

The Senators returned to their seats in the Senate Chamber and work on the calendar was resumed. Mr. Dortch in the chair.

Bill for the better protection of sheep husbandry in North Carolina was put upon its second reading and provoked considerable discussion.

Mr Scott, of New Hanover—This bill, introduced by myself, provides for the levying and collection of a special tax of \$2 on every dog in the State, as there are so many dogs sheep husbandry cannot prosper.

Mr Clark—There are a great many possums in my section and for this very reason I do not want dogs taxed. Many of the colored people make their Christmas money by catching possums and they are not able to pay these taxes.

Mr Morehead sent forward an amendment making the tax 50 cents on every dog, instead of \$2.

Mr Alexander stated that there was a law already in force against sheep-killing dogs.

Mr Clarke moved to table the whole matter and called for the ayes and nays. The vote stood 22 to table, 17 against it.

Bill providing that witnesses before magistrates' courts shall receive \$1 per day, both in criminal and civil actions, was placed upon its second reading and referred to the judiciary committee.

The bill to exempt farming implements and mechanical tools from taxation was referred to the finance committee.

The bill in regard to levying and collecting taxes passed and was ordered engrossed.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

The following bills were introduced and passed their first reading, and were appropriately referred:

Mr Stafford, for the relief of Bland Wallace, former sheriff of Duplin county.

Mr Powers, of Cumberland, to enable the people of Cumberland county to establish a free bridge across the Cape Fear river.

Mr Bailey, of Mecklenburg, to establish two judicial districts. To regulate late transcripts on appeal.

Mr Poe, to amend the mechanics' lien law.

The calendar was then taken up and the following bills were disposed of:

To regulate fishing in Pamlico and Tar rivers. Mr Baum moved to amend by striking out the Falls of Tar river and inserting Wilmington & Weldon Railroad, which was adopted. The bill then passed its third reading.

To compel the Carolina Central Railroad to draw off the stagnant water pooled between Rockingham and Pee Dee rivers. Passed its second reading and referred.

To protect fish in Lumber river. Withdrawn by consent.

To prescribe the venue in actions against sheriffs.

At 12 o'clock Speaker Rose called the House to order. The Senate was announced and came in and took the seals assigned them.

That part of the journals of the Senate and House referring to the election of United States Senator was read.

Speaker Rose then announced that Gen Ransom, having received a majority of 61 votes, was elected United States Senator for the six year term next beginning.

Concerning lands owned by the board of education.

On motion of Mr Waddell the bill incorporating the Coast Line Turnpike Company, passed its third reading.

To amend the landlord and tenant act, passed its third reading.
