**The State Guard.**  
Some weeks past a call was issued by Infantry for a convention of the State members of the Wilmington Light Guard, to meet at Raleigh, prepare a bill for the aid of troops of the State, &c. Yesterday afternoon the convention met in the Mayor's office. The attendance was very large, nearly every company in the State, both white and colored, being represented.

The meeting was called to order by Capt. E. R. Page, of Gen Hancock's staff, who called Capt. John L. Cantwell, of the Wilmington Light Infantry, to the chair. In a few neatly turned phrases Capt. Cantwell congratulated the convention upon the large attendance and the spirit manifested.

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A committee on permanent organization was appointed, which reported the following permanent officers. President, Gen. Johnstone Jones; vice presidents, Capt. A. J. Ellington, of Reidsville; Maj. E. F. McKee, of Shoe Heel; secretaries, Capt. Thos Parker, of Salisbury; Lt. E. F. Smith and H. H. Roberts, Raleigh.

Gen. Jones, on taking the chair, made an excellent speech in which he reviewed the good work done by the State Guard since its organization in 1877, whenever it had been called on. He felt sure the Legislature recognized the fact that the Guard should be aided by the State. A State institution, organized under the constitution, and for State purposes, it must be aided by the State. Events had clearly shown the necessity of the organization. The very law itself declares that shall be maintained.

**To Eject Squatters.**  
Mr. W. S. O'B. Robinson, U. S. District Attorney, arrived here yesterday and put up at the Purcell House.
