Gen. Joseph E. Johnson was in Charlotte on Sunday.

Oregon canned in 1882 531,760 cases of salmon, valued at \$2,782,000.

It costs \$2,935,158 a year to run the public printing office at Washington.

The "Woman's Insurance Company" opened for business yesterday in New York.

It is said that 20,763 persons have perished at sea during the past five years.

Mr. Blaine has quietly started on his tour of the South, according to a Washington special.

The quail cater in New York is doing famously now. He polished off his 23rd brace on Monday in 74 minutes.

Dr. Grissom in his report states that in the Western counties there are 267 insane whites unprovided for and in the Eastern counties 252.

It is complained that sneak thieves make their way into the White House at Washington, and steal therefrom numbers of small articles.

"Mr. Isaacs," by Mr. Crawford, a son of the sculptor, is the book most talked about now. It is said that the American edition is already exhausted.

Senator Hill, of Colorado, is charged with saying that there is more corruption in the Department of the Interior than there ever was before, and that Secretary Teller is responsible for it.

Three hundred bushels of red oak acorns and a hundred and twenty bushels of hickory nuts have been recently shipped to England and Germany by the Secretary of the Interior, for seed purposes.

Two negroes had a pickled pig-foot eating match one day last week. One ate 45 and the other 40, a total in weight of 36 pounds, within three hours. At last accounts they were both still living.

The situation at Wilkesbarre is interesting. It is feared that the earth will sink still further when the frost is all out of the ground. The parts of the mine under the town are so filled with gas that they cannot be entered.

"Old man Flood," the California money-god, made his daughter Jennie a present of \$500,000 on New Year's. She took the tide at the Flood, and whenever she does get tied by the parson there will be a golden flood for some lucky fellow.

A story which has been going the rounds to the effect that the New York World has been sold to Mr. John R. McLean, and that Mr. Geo. Alfred Townsend (Gath) is to edit it, is denied by Mr. McLean, who says that he has not bought the World; that he has not offered to buy it, and that he does not believe it is for sale.

A new fire escape was tried in New York on Monday. It is a wire ladder, made of 7.32 inch cable, with 4 inch gas pipe rungs and wrought steel hooks. A ladder 50 feet long wound on a reel is 15 inches in diameter and weighs but 40 pounds. It will stand a one-ton pressure. A trial was made from the fifth story of the Leland House and it was very successful.

There is talk of having the legislative sessions in Illinois once every six years only. If such should become the case, there will be lots of fat takes for the lawyers, for any amount of litigation will follow as sure as darkness follows daylight. Even biennial sessions, as is the case with us, are too infrequent. The law-makers of the people should meet regularly every year, for the reason that the necessities of the public require it and this is, we think, a fact which has been sufficiently demonstrated.

A colored individual in Alabama was recently convicted of violating a State law by living in the marriage relation with a white woman. The defendant held that the law was in conflict with the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution, and appealed his case to the Supreme Court. That tribunal decided that the law prohibiting miscegenation is not in conflict with the Fourteenth Amendment, or with the civil rights legislation founded on it, for the reason that it applies the same punishment to both offenders, the white and the black, without discrimination.

Miss Mary Anderson played Parthenia in New York on Monday evening and the Sun says of her representation: Miss Mary Anderson began to play Parthenia at 8 o'clock last evening with such intense emotion and excessive perturbation that at the end of the first act the audience was quite exhausted. It was impossible to sit through the act without feeling sorry that an actress of Miss Mary Anderson's power should mar the effect of her work by overacting. She crowded so much violent emotion into this act that the audience looked for nothing else during the evening but harrowing declamation and visible physical agony. Therein the audience was happily disappointed. It would seem as though Miss Anderson had come upon the stage charged with so much turbulent passion that she felt it necessary to express it all before she could show any of the milder qualities of Parthenia. Having got it off her mind, she gave in the second act such a delightful, piquant, and graceful picture of the girl's first experience in love that she won the sympathy and admiration of the whole audience.

Venno's Prophecies for February.

1, 3; probably moderate or mild weather, changing to colder evening of 3rd, in most sections; 4 5 6 stormy and colder with general snow-falls and rain-falls according to locality, up to 6th, a decided "dip"; 7, Ash Wednesday—mild with snow; 8 fair and mild; 9 fair and mild; 10 cloudy and threatening; 11 probably stormy and wet weather; 12, 13, 14, 15, 16; Valentine's Day—a mild period and generally open weather. Rains in some sections. 17, 18, colder and stormy weather; 19 generally stormy; heavy snow-falls again, 20 21, 22, 23, moderate and changeable, cloudy with snow-falls, possibly rains and floods West; 24, 25, 26, mild with windy weather and rains; snow-falls and stormy weather West; 27, 28, March bluster commencing; rain and snow falls. Should the first three days of the month prove stormy and cold the same condition is likely to occur at the close of the month. There are all ready indications of great precipitation for February, and as we expect the average temperature of the month will be higher than usual, much of this precipitation will come as rain. Consequently, when we give as probabilities heavy rainfalls, we must of necessity add "floods" in many sections of the United States through which a long drought has been experienced up to the present time. March, on the other hand, will again be full of snow storms and cold "dips," and altogether a very wintry month. As we have elsewhere stated, the March storms this year are likely to be snow blockades, February and April this year will be full of water. March and May full of cold and snow.
