We find in the News and Observer the following synopsis of the a introduced by Mr. Boykin, Senator from Sampson county:

A majority of the committee on the railroad commission have agreed to report favorably the Boykin bill, with certain amendments. A minority report will be submitted. The committee met in the private secretary's office yesterday and came to their conclusion after a long session. The Boykin bill provides for three commissioners to be elected by the General Assembly, at a salary of \$3,000, to be paid out of the State Treasury, which will be reimbursed by an assessment by the auditor upon the gross earnings of the different railroads. The commissioners elect a clerk and prescribe his duties. His salary is \$1,300. The term of office is four years. The commissioners have the right to superintend, regulate and control railroads and to prevent unjust and unreasonable discriminations. They fix a time schedule for the roads, have the power, and it is their duty to investigate all accidents, &c. Report to the General Assembly. They have a general supervising power over the roads.

The bill should be entitled "an act to throttle enterprise, to open wide the door for corruption and abuse, to establish an autocratic board, to make the railroads pay for their own undoing and to deprive the county coroners in North Carolina of the benefits and emoluments of their offices." One would think, to read the above report, that railroad authorities were no better than common marauders, that nobody now in railroad employ had sense enough to make up a proper time schedule; and that the engineers and conductors on the various lines were in the habit every day of running over and knocking people to pieces just for the mere fun of the thing.

The terms of the sale were one-third cash, balance in 6 and 12 months.

Commissioner's Meeting.

The board of County Commissioners of New Hanover County met in regular session in their room adjoining the Court House at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon: Present Mr. H. A. Bagg, chairman, and Messrs. Roger Moore, James A. Montgomery, E. I. Peace, and B. G. Worth, Commissioners. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Treasurer submitted his report for the month of January, the general fund showing a balance on hand of \$28,198.58, and exhibited 23 bonds of \$100 each, one bond of \$500, ten coupons of \$8 each and two coupons of \$15 each, and said bonds and coupons were burned in the presence of the Board. The educational fund showed a balance on hand of \$17,600.37.

The Register of Deeds submitted his report of receipts from marriage license for the month of January showing the same to be \$13.30, and exhibited the Treasurer's receipt for the same.

John H. Savage, superintendent elect of the Poor House, exhibited his official bond in the sum of \$1,000, with John H. Strauss, Wm. Larkins, L. H. Bowden and J. R. Melton as sureties and his official bond as superintendent of the House of Correction, in the sum of \$500, with J. H. Strauss, and Wm. Larkins as sureties, which bonds were approved, registered and ordered filed.

J. H. Horn, a magistrate of the county, made his annual report which was received, entered on the records of official reports and filed.

B. F. Bryant was elected constable of Harnett township.

J. W. Millis was elected constable to fill the vacancy in Cape Fear township.

The Board then adjourned, subject to the call of the Chairman.

After the adjournment of the Board of County Commissioners, this afternoon, the Board of Education was convened and was still in session when our report closed.

The Royal Arcanum.

We have received from Mr. B. A. Hallet, Secretary of Cornelius Harnett Council, No. 221, Royal Arcanum, his report on the Fourth Anniversary of the Council, held on the 9th ult. It makes a very flattering exhibit. We clip somewhat from the report as follows:

In my last report the membership of the Order was 33,078, in 632 Councils, while to-day it is 726 Councils and 40,361 members a gain of 94 Councils, and 7,183 members over and above all losses from deaths and suspensions in the past year.

There have been 230 deaths during the year, equal to a death rate of 3.5 of one per cent., or 64 deaths to the thousand on the averaged membership for the year. The amount expended to pay the Benefits on these deaths was \$673,500 making the total amount paid since the organization of the Order, on the 580 deaths that have occurred, the large sum of \$1,725,000, all of which has been paid with forty days after proof of death was furnished, and without litigation in a single instance. In several instances, however, the Benefit has been turned over to the courts when there was litigation among the beneficiaries.

There have been but ten Assessments called during the past year, which is the same number reported on last Anniversary; and I think we may confidently rely on there being no material increase in the future, so long as the Order shall continue to make a gain of 7,000 new lives annually.

B'Nai B'Rith.

The annual session of the District Grand Lodge of the Independent order of B'Nai B'Rith will convene in this city to-morrow morning at 11 o'clock. Quite a number of delegates have already arrived and many others are expected here to-night and to-morrow morning. It is expected that the attendance will be very large and that the occasion will be an unusually interesting one.

Our wish is to extend to their visitors a very cordial welcome and will do all that within them lies to render their visit a pleasant one.

Among the entertainments offered will be a complimentary ball and banquet, to take place at Germania Hall on Wednesday evening next. We have before us one of the programmes issued for the occasion and it is a handsome affair.
