Senator-elect Bowen, of Colorado, is estimated to be worth \$5,000,000.

This American Navy asks for \$100,-000 to spend upon torpedoes.

Dwight M. Sabin, the new Senator from Minnesota, has at present large State prison contracts and is said to be worth several millions.

The Southern Exposition will be held at Louisville, Ky., beginning Aug. 1, 1883, and continuing one hundred days. Over \$252,000 have been subscribed by the people of Louisville.

The House of Delegates of West Virginia, by the decisive vote of 49 to 14, has passed a resolution providing for an amendment to the constitution prohibiting the sale of liquor in that State.

An effort is to be made to form another State of the size of Rhode Island. Massachusetts has lately recovered 45 acres from Little Rhody, and it is proposed to give us another New England State.

Austin, the foundations of which are following evening. just now laid, will cost \$3,000,000 and will be one of the handsomest buildings in the country.

Chicago is reported to have 64 miltionaires, among whom are Cyrus H. McCormick, Marshall Field, "Long John" Wentworth and George M. Pullman. Eight of the 64 are bankers. The real estate millionaires are estimated to be worth \$,000,000.

There is a well-founded rumor that the friends of ex-Treasurer Polk will make good his detalcation and apply to Judge James M. Quarles, of the Criminal Court, for a reduction of the one hundred thousand dollar bail bond. It is also said that in this event Judge Quarles will make the bond ten thousand dollars.

Senator Blair's bill for assisting publie education in the South does' not create a permanent school fund, but proposes to expend for the first year \$15.000,000, to be distributed on the basis of illiteracy; for the second year, \$14,000,000, and \$1,000,000 less each year for ten years, when the distribution ceases. In ten years the expenditure would reach \$105,000,000.

The complete immigration statistics for the year 1882, published by the Treasury Department quite recently, show the total immigration for the year to have been 712,542. This is a magnificent showing, but the increase over 1981 is only 5 per cent. Of the whole number of arrivals, New York received 472,938, or considerably more than onehalf. Three times as many came from Germany as from any other country.
