THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY. SENATE.

THIRTY-FOURTH DAY. FRIDAY, February 9, 1883.

Mr. Clark, resolution requesting the State treasurer to inform the people how much the Western road has cost the State. Also, resolution asking the superintendent of the penitentiary why the public road is not opened from Quaker's Bridge, in Jones, to Tar Landing, in Onslow county.

Mr. Cahoon asked a suspension of the rules, and the bill to change the name of the Edenton and Norfolk Railway Company to Carolina and Chesapeake Railroad Company, restricting it to go by Williamston, was put on its readings. Passed third reading.

The special order, the sale of the State's stock in the Cape Fear and Yadkin Valley Railroad, was taken up. The chair conceived that the first thing was the consideration of the amendment recommended by the committee.

The first amendment was Mr. Linney's, that no convicts should be employed on any branch of said road except the Yadkin Valley branch, until the said railroad is completed to Mount Airy and Patterson. And then Mr. McLean's amendment to this, providing for the building of the road from Fayetteville to the South Carolina line.

Mr. Linney said he hoped the Senator from Robeson would withdraw his amendment, as the effect of it would be to dig up the whole project. The amendment was defeated. The bill was postponed until Monday, so that Mr. Poole, who is absent, may be here, as he desires to offer a substitute.

Mr. Payne, bill relative to the method of allotting dower. Mr. Clark's resolution concerning the Western road, was adopted, enquiring how much it has cost the State. Mr. Purnell asked for a suspension of the rules, and the bill to incorporate the Citizens Trust Company was placed on its readings. This company is at Raleigh. The capital stock is \$50,000. It has power to lease warehouses and carry on the business of warehousemen, also the power to construct warehouses; the officers to consist of a president and five directors.

Bill passed its third reading. Mr. Richardson, bill to divide North Carolina into nine Congressional districts. Special order, on giving the State's interest in the Albemarle and Chesapeake canal to the Newbern and Beaufort Canal Company, came up. Mr. Strayhorn offered an amendment, giving the State authorities the right to control toll.

On motion of Mr. Womack the Senate adjourned. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. Petitions were introduced as follows: Mr. Covington, from Richmond county, asking a repeal of liquor purchase law.

Mr. Riggs, by request, memorial of Wiltos L. Young, claiming to have discovered a safe harbor north of Cape Hatteras. Mr. Page, resolution to adjourn sine die at 12 m on July 4th, A D 1883. Calendar.

Bills were introduced, passed their first reading and were disposed of as follows: Mr. Bunn, to divide North Carolina into nine Congressional districts. Ordered printed. Mr. Myers, for the relief of certain soldiers of the late civil war. Finance. Mr. Myers, for the relief of the blind Finance.

The calendar was taken up and bills were disposed of as follows: To repeal certain provisions of chapters 191 and 210, laws of 1881. Mr. Green, of New Hanover, moved to make this bill the special order for next Thursday, and that it be printed.

Mr. Stanford said that the bill merely gave the city of Wilmington power to regulate the conduct of its market; that the best people of that city were in favor of it. Messrs. Hayes, of Robeson, Harris of Wake, Waddell and Powers, of Cumberland, spoke in opposition to the bill. Mr. Stanford said that the people of Wilmington who had petitioned that this bill pass were large tax payers, and were men of whom any city might be proud.

STATE NEWS.

Wadesboro Times: The American Aid Society of York, Pa., have decided to invest, through Mr. Patrick, immigration agent, the sum of \$35,000 in lands in the counties of Cumberland and Lincoln.

Chatham Record: We are informed by Mr. Wiley Goodwin, of New Hope township, that his two sons, aged 15 and 8 years, raised last year 80 barrels of corn, 2 bales of cotton, 10 stacks of oats, and fattened 1,500 pounds of pork. Toisnot Home: Mr. Augustin Farmer, who lives about two miles west of this place, killed five large wild turkeys at one shot, on Tuesday of this week. Mr. Farmer is very much of a sportsman for his age, he being now about 81 years old.

Wilson Advance: Mr. D. S. Carraway, editor of the Sittings, has rented Marmona Opera House. There was what was known as a runaway marriage town Monday. The contracting parties were Mr. L. M. Moss and Miss M. S. Sorsby, both of Nash county. The horrible death of a healthy and stout negro man named William Evans is reported at Whitakers. While talking of going to South Carolina in turpentine, blood commenced pouring from his mouth and nose, and he died from suffocation in twenty minutes.

Charlotte Journal: S. H. Hilton, Esq., who resides three miles southwest of Charlotte, recently sold a gold mine to a northern company for \$6,000, and the tract of land conveyed with the mine was yesterday surveyed by the county surveyor. A company of enterprising gentlemen in Wadesboro have taken steps toward the organization of a National bank for their town. It is proposed to begin the business with a capital stock of \$50,000, \$35,000 of which has been subscribed, two individuals having taken each \$12,500 of the stock.

Monroe Express: Mr. Charles Cox, a young merchant of Big Lick, Stanly county, was murdered on the streets of that place on last Saturday night by being shot down on the streets in the dark by some unknown party. The revival at the Baptist church, of which we spoke last week, is still being continued by Revs. Dr. Harrell and J. E. King. The meetings are largely attended and great interest is manifested in the congregations. Thus far there have been a large number of conversions and about fifteen accessions to the church.

Newbernian: Hyacinths, jonquils, crocuses, winter jessamine and violets are now making our flower yards look gay and inviting. The steam tug Swan, owned by Mr. D. Stinson, sank at her wharf last Sunday, the result of boys tampering with the machinery and pipes. In viewing the truck farms in the immediate vicinity of this city, on Sunday last, with the sun shining genial and breezes blowing soft and balmy, it was not difficult to imagine that we were in the midst of May. Lettuce, peas, radishes and other vegetables and garden sars were carpeting the earth with mantles of green.

Revival in Decatur, Ill. DECATUR, Ill., Feb. 8.—To-day the Methodist Church was filled four times with 1,000 to 1,200 persons attending the all-day jubilee services. Over 1,000 persons have been converted at the Rev. Mr. Harrison's meetings, which were begun ten weeks ago. The first meeting to-day was at 6 A. M., when 600 to 800 persons attended, and many converts gave their experience. The resident and two visiting clergymen spoke at the 10 o'clock meeting, and this afternoon the boy preacher told his personal experience, which was supplementary to his talk on the baptism of fire, delivered yesterday. The eleventh week of the revival closed to-night with a monster congregation present. Nightly there have been from forty to sixty seekers at the altar and twenty to thirty-five conversions. The total number of converts to date is 1,020, with 1,000 more on the anxious seat. Harrison said to-day that he would not leave Decatur until his work was finished, which means that he will stay here as long as the crowds come, and there is no abatement whatever in interest of this revival, which all visitings ministers declare to be the most wonderful in its result they ever attended. Persons seeking religion have come here a distance of 100 miles. Parents from neighboring towns come here with their children and stay until they are converted.
