Charles A Brosius recently died in Germany leaving a fortune of 33,000,000, and no family. His relatives are all in this country, in Missouri, Indiana and Illinois.

General James Watson Webb, of New York, who began to do newspaper work fifty-six years ago, drank to his own health on his eighty-first birthday on Saturday.

Whiskey is called "cold tea," in the Senate wing of the Capitol at Washington. Whiskey—under that name—is prohibited, but law-makers are law-breakers as well as other people.

Queen Victoria's private estates extend over 37,372 acres, and the annual rental is £20,773. This does not include the domain of Claremont. The Queen has property at Coburg and Baden-Baden.

In France in 1881 there were more than a million residents of foreign birth chiefly Belgians, Germans, Swiss and Italians. England, with 27,000,000, has only 140,000 foreigners; Germany, with 45,000,000, only 270,000; while France, with 37,400,000, has 1,000,000.

If some good Christian would inveigle the present legislature of North Carolina within the walls of the Insane Asylum and then close the gates on them until March 1st, he would be a public benefactor. No fear but that they would make themselves at home there.

From the annual return of the British army just issued it appears that the average effective strength of the regular forces during the year 1882 was 188,896. This number comprises 17,099 cavalry, 33,377 artillery, 5,510 royal engineers, and 138,792 infantry of all branches. The average number of officers was 7,612.

Mr. Wm. E. Dodge, for many years past the head of the well-known metal firm of Phelps, Dodge & Co., died in New York on Saturday, aged 78 years. He was the father of Gen. Dodge, who was in command here soon after the war, and was a very wealthy and influential man. He gave away \$100,000 a year in charities.

A bill to provide a mansion for the Governor has passed the Senate and goes to the House. The proposed building, it is estimated, will cost about \$35,000. If the House kills the bill it will do a righteous thing. There are many things needed now in North Carolina worse than a mansion for the Governor and many things that should be done and provided before that mansion is built. For the next four or five years at least the Governor could be comfortably housed in a rented building—or else he could still "hang out" at the Yarborough House, where Dr. Blackhall ought to be patriotic enough to contribute the amount of his keeping to the benefit of the State—and of the Yarborough House.

Tennessee Coal.
Mr. F. W. Clark, General Freight Agent of the Carolina Central R. R., informs us that there are now en route three different shipments to this port of coal from the Coal Creek mines in Tennessee, which it is hoped are merely the forerunners of hundreds of others. This coal is bituminous. It will be distributed in small quantities to consumers in this city who will be requested to give it a fair test. Some dealer will probably take hold of it if arrangements can be made to put it down here at prices that will justify the selling of it here, which we understand will surely be done.

Nine Days.
There is a strong desire here to open a vegetable and fruit trade with Western North Carolina, but it would appear as though fate and the time tables were against it. A grocer here received today a lot of cabbages and apples, from Pigeon River, which were nine days on the road. As a consequence of the delays in transit both vegetables and fruit were in rather a dilapidated condition on arrival. The apples were evidently excellent when shipped and such as survived the wear and tear of travel and lay-overs are in every respect equal, if not superior to the Northern apples. We submit that nine days is too long a time for the trip from Pigeon to Wilmington. Goods could be received from San Francisco in that period. If the time could be reduced one-half the railroads as well as the people would profit by the increased trade between the East and the West.

Regulations for Lent.
The following regulations for Lent in the Vicarite-Apostolic in this State for the year 1883, have been promulgated by Rt. Rev. H. P. Northrop, Vicar-Apostolic of North Carolina:
1 All the faithful who have completed their twenty-first year are, unless legitimately dispensed, bound to observe the fast of Lent.
2 They are to make only one meal a day, excepting Sundays.
3 The meal allowed on fast days is not to be taken till about noon.
4 Flesh meat and fish are not to be used at the same meal during Lent.
5 A small refreshment, commonly called collation, is allowed in the evening, not to exceed the fourth part of a meal.
6 It is permitted to use bread, butter, cheese, eggs, milk, all kinds of fruits, salads, vegetables and fish at the collation.
7 General usage has made it lawful to take in the morning some warm liquid, as tea, coffee, or thin chocolate made with water, and a mouthful of bread.
8 Necessity and custom have authorized the use of hog's lard, as well as butter, in preparing the permitted food.
9 The following persons are exempted from the obligation of fasting: Persons under twenty-one years of age; the sick; pregnant and nursing women; those who are obliged to do hard labor; all who through weakness, cannot fast without prejudice to their health.
10 By dispensation, the use of flesh meat will be allowed at all meals on Sundays, and once a day on Mondays, Thursdays and Saturdays, with the exception of Holy Thursday, and the second and last days of Lent.
11 The faithful are reminded that besides the obligation of fasting imposed by the Church, this holy season of Lent should be, in an especial manner, a time of earnest prayer, of sorrow for sin, of seclusion from the world and its amusements, and of generous almsgiving.
12 The paschal time extends from the first Sunday in Lent till Trinity Sunday, during which time all Catholics who have attained a fitting age are bound to prepare themselves to receive worthily the Holy Communion. The holy season of Lent is a very proper time also for children to go to their first confession, which they ought to do generally when about seven years of age. Parents should see to this.

A Handsome Steam Yacht.

A very handsome steam yacht, built near Brooklyn, N. Y., and owned by Mr. Crockett, a wealthy sea captain, arrived here Saturday night en route to Cedar Keys, Florida. The yacht is 48 feet long and 8 feet beam, and is named J. A. Cloud, in compliment to Dr. Cloud, of New York, the gentleman who constructed the water-works in this city. It was built at a cost \$2,500, and is a model of its kind. The yacht left New York on Wednesday night last, and is being shipped on two large flats belonging to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company. It will leave to-night for Cedar Keys, and is to ply between that port and Clear Water Harbor, a distance of about 120 miles. The boat is in charge of Messrs Joseph Austin and Alexander Barber, both of Brooklyn. The estimated cost of conveying it to its destination is \$500.
