1,000 Families in New Albany Driven From Their Homes.

Driven From Their Homes.

Cincinnati, Feb. 18.— The river has fallen about seven fee', and is now at a standstill. Another rise is coming from above, which may cause a slight swell here, but can do little additional damage. Up to this time the fall is not sufficient to reveal the extent of the loss. It is known, however, that many building are cracked or undermined, so that if they do not fall they will have to be demolished. The slow decline of the water is considered advantageous. The gas works expect to resume to morrow. The water works are lifting 11,000,000 gallons daily, and fears of a water famine have vanished. More than \$2.000 remaining in the hands of the German Reliet Committee have been divided, \$1,000 being sent to Germany and the remainder retained here.
