A New Postal Telegraph Company has been born. Its ostensible mission in life is to fight the Western Union; its actual accomplishment will be a pleasant and easy death by absorption into the bowels of that great monopoly, provided it ever gets large enough to be palatable.

### County Institutions.

During the last session of court a committee of members of the grand jury, appointed for the purpose, visited the jail and poor house of the county and investigated their condition. The report stated that both institutions were found in excellent condition, a due regard being paid to the safety and security combined with the health of those in the jail, and for the comfort of those who are inmates of the poor house.

### For the Penitentiary.

Sheriff Manning will leave to-morrow morning for Raleigh, with the prisoners sentenced at the recent term of the Criminal Court to the penitentiary. The following is the list with the terms for which they were respectively sentenced:

J. A. McKee, larceny, six years; J. W. Wilburn, false pretense, five years; John McGuire, maiming a hog, four years; W. H. Campbell, larceny, three years; Henry Nichols, larceny, three years; James Burnett, larceny, two years.

### House of Correction.

The following persons were sentenced to the County House of Correction at the recent term of the Criminal Court:

Andrew Morris, larceny, sixteen months; Letitia Taylor, larceny, sixteen months; James Eagles, assault and battery, twelve months; George Landers, assault and battery, six months; William Larkins, larceny, six months; William Jones, assault and battery, three months; Thomas Dunn, assault and battery, six months.

During the term six were sentenced to a term of years in the State Penitentiary, seven to the County House of Correction, twenty-nine were settled by fines and costs and in five cases judgment was suspended, and there was one appeal, making forty-eight cases in which convictions were obtained.

### Mrs. Matthews's Bond Suit.

Judge Bond has just rendered an opinion in the Circuit Court of the United States for the Eastern District of North Carolina in the case of Virginia B. Matthews against the trustees of the first mortgage bondholders of the late Carolina Central Railway Company, in the course of which he says: "This is a bill to dissolve the organization of the company and establish it under a new plan, alleged to have been the only one to which the plaintiff, who is a large bondholder of a former organization, over agreed, and also for injunction and a receiver."

It seems that Mrs. Matthews was the owner of 1,194 bonds, for the sum of \$1,000 each, secured by a first mortgage on the railway; also of second mortgage bonds to the amount of \$2,550,000. The company made default in payment of interest and the foreclosure and sale followed on May 31, 1880, under regular proceedings. The defendants at the sale were a committee appointed by the first mortgage bondholders, who became purchasers. A new company formed—the Carolina Central Railway Company—to which all the property and franchises of the old corporation were conveyed free and discharged from all former liens and encumbrances. In our opinion Edward Matthews, the husband of Virginia B. Matthews, was as appears from the whole case, if not the real owner of these securities, the complainant's plenary attorney, and the case must be treated as if he were the plaintiff or as if all his acts and declarations were those of his wife. Several plans of reorganization had been agreed upon between Graves, a defendant, and Matthews; two gave an undue advantage to the old second mortgage bonds (meaning Matthews), which were abandoned, and Mrs. Matthews signed a paper authorizing Francis O. French, a defendant, to designate a plan and making him substantially arbitrator. On December 12, 1879, Mrs. Matthews sold \$500,000 of the old first bonds to R. A. Lancaster & Co., hypothecated \$500,000 more on a loan from French, Stout & Graves and gave them a power of attorney for five years to vote on \$1,000,000 of her bonds, including the \$500,000 hypothecated ones, on condition that they should approve the plan of reorganization. This latter plan was, by plaintiff abrogated on the 15th of May, 1880, French being authorized to designate a new plan. Before this, however, on the twelfth day of May, 1880, more than five-sixths of the old bondholders had entered into an agreement looking to the purchase of the C. C. Railroad at the foreclosure sale. This paper was signed by complainant, among others, and was binding upon all who signed it, and the Court, as far as the nature of the case permitted, would enforce it. The purchase was made under this instrument and no organization not effected in accordance with its terms, would have had the consent of the parties in interest, while it remained in force.

"We are now asked to enforce it. It is plain we ought not to do so. It is not within the terms of the instrument of May 12, 1880. The complainant received new bonds; she attempted to buy more and offered to sell them, and brought suit for some she claimed to be hers. To come into a court of equity and ask it to set aside the organization of the new company under those circumstances and to take its property out of its hands and put into those of a receiver is little else than monstrous." "The motion for injunction and receiver is therefore denied." Messrs. John F. Dillon and McRae and Russell appeared for plaintiff and Messrs. Paterson, Davis and Stedman & Latimer for defendants.—N. Y. World.

### Very Ill.

We are sorry to hear that the venerable Mrs. Stewart is very ill at her residence in Smithville. She was attacked about a week ago and at the last reports her situation was very critical, the entire left side being paralyzed. Her daughters, Mrs. Warren, of this city; Mrs. Barnes, of Wilson and Mrs. Crayner, of Smithville, have been with her since the first attack. Mrs. Stewart is now 88 years of age and the chances of recovery are, we fear, against her.

### Iolanthe.

It is now understood that Ford's Opera Company have made a positive engagement for the Opera House in this city and if they do not break it we may surely look for a representation here on the evening of March 7th, of the new and pleasing opera of Iolanthe. We are satisfied that Mr. Ford will not regret the venture, in a pecuniary sense, as the probability is that the house will be packed from the parquette to the peanut gallery.

Mr. Strange was present at the Mardi Gras celebration in New Orleans and since then has visited the Hot Springs, in Arkansas, and some other places of resort in the Southwest.

Mr. Thos. H. Hardin, of Hickory, is in the city to-day. Mr. Hardin was, in ante-bellum days, a resident of this city, where he held the position of cashier of the Cape Fear Bank, and he has many friends and acquaintances here yet.

Our good friend Perry Gleaves, formerly with Giles & Murphison of this city, but now traveling in conjunction with Mr. A. D. Lippitt, for the hardware house of Conklin & Co., of Baltimore, is also here to-day, on one of his rare and brief visits.
