DEATH OF MR. STEPHENS.

Alexander Hamilton Stephens, Governor of Georgia and ex-Vice President of the Confederate States, died at the Executive Mansion in Atlanta - at Saturday midnight. On Saturday it seems that there were some hopes of his recovery, but at 11 o'clock on Saturday night, only one hour before his death, it was known that he could live but a very short time. He has been very il, since his attendance on the Sesqui-Cen ternial Celebration at Savannah and the delivery of his wonderful oration on that occasion was the last public act of his life.

1832 and atterward began the practice invited. of law.

In 1836 he was elected to the Georgia Legislature, serving for five successive terms in the lower house, and in 1842 he entered the State Senate. In the following year he was elected to Congress and remained there until 1859, declining then to become a candidate again. He vigorously opposed the secession of Georgia. When the Provisional Congress met in Mongomery Mr. Stephens was chosen Vice President of the Confederate States, and was afterwards elected to the same position by the people. In 1863 he was chosen a commissioner to arrange for an exchange of prisoners with the United States government, but his mission was not attended with success, as the Federal government declined to receive any proposition looking to an exchange In 1865 he was one of the three commissioners who conferred with President Lincoln at Fortress Monroe with a view to putting a stop to the war. but whose negotiations were truitless .-Shortly after the surrender he was arrested and imprisoned in Fort Warren, Boston Harbor. After a short confinement he was released on parole and returned to his home in Georgia. In 1866 the Legislature which met after the State had been reconstructed according to President Johnson's policy, elected Mr Stephens and Herschel V. Johnson to seats in the United States Senate, but they were not permitted to take their seats. From that time until lought with much bitterness the Greeley movement in 1872 and supported Charles O'Conor. In 1873 he was elected to Congress from the Eighth district to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Gen. A R. Wright, He served consecutive terms in Congress until his nomination for Governor last year when he was elected by over 62,000 ma-
