DEATH OF MR. STEPHENS.

Alexander Hamilton Stephens, Governor of Georgia and ex-Vice President of the Confederate States, died at the Executive Mansion in Atlanta at Saturday midnight.

Mr. Stephens was born in Taliaferro county, Georgia, February 11th 1812, and was there for a little more than 71 years of age at the time of his death.

In 1836 he was elected to the Georgia Legislature, serving for five successive terms in the lower house, and in 1842 he entered the State Senate.

In 1865 he was one of the three commissioners who conferred with President Lincoln at Fortress Monroe with a view to putting a stop to the war.

Shortly after the surrender he was arrested and imprisoned in Fort Warren, Boston Harbor. After a short confinement he was released on parole and returned to his home in Georgia.
