THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

SENATE.

NIGHT SESSION.

THURSDAY, March 9, 1883.

The bill to revise and consolidate the public school law, passed third reading. Bill to regulate appeals from allotment of exempt property, passed third reading.

Bill to declare the mother of children in certain cases their natural guardian; it makes it so that the mother can sue where the husband is dead and get the pay for services of her children, if necessary. Passed third reading.

Bill to prohibit the taking of oysters from Myrtle Grove Sound, in New Hanover county, passed third reading. Bill to amend chapter 143, public laws of 1879, as to laying off a canal in Pender county, draining of Angola Bay, passed third reading.

Bill to amend section 3, chapter 173, laws of 1879, in regard to giving six soldiers with eyes shot out, (only six in the State,) five dollars a year. Mr. Watson said since then one of these was dead, and this bill increased their pay to ten dollars a year; passed third reading.

Bill in relation to fishing in the waters of White Oak and New rivers, and the sounds between them, passed third reading.

Bill to amend the law touching the seduction of women; in regard to pleading in civil action—not necessary to allege the relation of master and servant, in certain cases.

Mr. Scott of New Hanover, had taken up the bill to allow a y three Mondays to the clerk of New Hanover county, to carry his son north for amputation of his leg.

Mr. Furnell amended to strike out "any" Accepted. The bill passed third reading.

Bill to establish public ferry across Waccamaw river, in Columbus county, passed third reading.

Bill to amend charter of town of Laurinburg, in Richmond county, passed third reading.

Bill relating to bringing stock from other States into this State passed third reading.

Bill to publish the reports of the supreme court; allows the Secretary of the State to have them published in or out of the State, passed its third reading.

The clerk read the name of the members recommended by the committee for the board of agriculture. (Published in yesterday's REVIEW.) Report was adopted.

Bill to prohibit liquor in one mile of Mt Tabor church in Columbus county, passed its third reading.

Bill in relation to the State's stock in the Atlantic and North Carolina Railroad Company.

The bill proposes appointing the Governor, Treasurer and Attorney-General commissioners, with full power to sell, transfer or assign, or merge the State's stock in that road.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

NIGHT SESSION.

THURSDAY, March 8, 1873.

In regard to the publishing of the Supreme Court Reports, amended so that not more than fifteen numbers shall be published in any one year; that before having said Reports republished the Secretary of State shall contract for the sale of at least one-half of the various reports he proposes to publish at a price not less than the cost of publication; third reading.

The election of the Directors of the new Board of Agriculture was then gone into.

The business of the House was temporarily suspended that some presentations of gifts might be made.

Mr. McLoud, of Buncombe, on the part of the House, presented Speaker Rose an elegant silver service, in the course of his remarks he warmly complimented Mr. Rose for his urbanity, judgment and ability as a parliamentarian.

SENATE.

FIFTY-SEVENTH DAY.

FRIDAY, March 9, 1883.

Mr. Dortch's bill to regulate the fees of justices of the peace concerning the probate of deeds passed third reading. Bill to protect the farmers of the State. Mr. Pemberton called it up. Passed third reading.

Bill came up as unfinished business relating to the State's stock in the Atlantic and North Carolina Railroad.

Mr. Clarke moved to refer it to the committee on internal improvements. Prevailed.

Bill concerning the great seal of the State, two and one-half inches in diameter, Liberty and Plenty facing each other, Plenty sitting down with three heads of wheat in one hand and the small end of a horn in the other, her hands extended towards Liberty, passed third reading.

Bill to fix the term of office of standard keeper; prescribes two years; passed third reading.

Resolution concerning charitable institutions of the State—for appointing colored men as officers for the colored asylums. Adopted.

Bill to amend the pharmacy act, passed third reading.

Bill for relief of soldiers of the late civil war between the States.

Mr. Scott of New Hanover, said he could afford to vote for this bill, though he fought on the other side, and were it in his State North, he would expect his Senators to vote for such help to the Union soldiers, and he took pleasure in voting this relief to the brave men of the South, and he called on Senators not to get behind the scenes, but to come up like brave men and vote for this bill. (Applause.)

Mr. Richardson said these brave men never decided in the war, and Senators should not be deciding now. The vote stood, yeas 21, nays 5, so the substitute passed third reading.

Mr. Watson said he would offer an amendment for the relief of the widows and orphans.

The vote stood: Ays 18, nays 11, so the bill passed second reading, and then passed third reading.

Bill to amend the law prescribing the duties of coroners, passed third reading.

Bill incorporating the Ladies' Benevolent Society, in Wilmington, passed third reading.

Bill regulating the partition of real estate between tenants-in-common, passed its third reading.

Senate resolution came up from the calendar, resolving that the thanks of the Senate are hereby tendered to the clerks and other officers and employees of this body, for their arduous labors and the uniform courtesy and kindness with which they have discharged their various duties during the present session of this Legislature. The resolution was adopted.

Resolution of thanks to Lieutenant-Governor Robinson was then taken up. Resolved, That the thanks of the Senate are hereby due and hereby tendered to Lieutenant-Governor J. A. Robinson, for the able, courteous and impartial manner in which he has presided over its deliberations during the present session. Adopted.

President Robinson returned thanks to the Senators for the warm and respectful manner in which they had treated him. He wished them all a safe and pleasant return to their homes, and long life and prosperity. He then declared the Senate adjourned until Monday morning at 11 o'clock.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. Bill concerning the great seal of the State, third reading.

To fix the standard weight for a barrel of pork, third reading.

Bill regulating fees of Superior Court clerks, in certain cases, third reading.

To allow the clerk of the Superior Court of New Hanover county to be absent from his office at certain times, passed third reading.

To furnish judges and solicitors of the State with copies of the laws of this session, passed third reading.

To require conditional sales of personal property where title is retained, to be registered, passed third reading.

To allow certain lands in New Hanover county, sold for taxes, to be redeemed, passed third reading.

The joint committee on the election of directors for the new agricultural department, made their report, announcing the election of the following gentlemen:

R. W. Wharton—1st District. A. G. Brooks—2nd District. J. A. Oates—3rd District. W. F. Green—4th District. I. W. Anderson—5th District. J. Robinson—6th District. A. Leazar—7th District. B. Blanton—8th District. C. D. Smith—9th District.

Bill to authorize the Governor to offer a reward for the apprehension of fugitives, passed third reading.

To fix the term of the standard keeper of the various counties. (Limits his term to two years.) Passed third reading.

To amend laws of 1846, relating to Richmond academy, Richmond county, passed third reading.

To incorporate the independent order of Good Daughters and Sons of the East, passed third reading.

To incorporate the Southern Bonanza Gold Mining Company, passed third reading.

To give two extra terms of the Superior Court, of one week each, to the county of New Hanover, third reading.

Resolution concerning the charitable institutions of the State. [To employ colored persons, at option of the directors, except as applicable to the penitentiary guard], third reading.

To protect fish in Union and Anson counties, third reading.

At prescribing the duties of the coroners of New Hanover and Brunswick counties, third reading.

Senate resolution to adjourn sine die on Monday at 12 m. was concurred in. The House reassembled at 2 p. m., and the Senate amendment (to the pensions to maimed soldiers) allowing \$50 to each widow of a deceased soldier, who is still a widow, was taken up for concurrence.

Mr. Tate said he thought the House desired to act intelligently, especially on a subject like this involving a large expenditure of the public money. The amount already given for this object will be about \$60,000. As we were about to adjourn the Senate put on an amendment that will kill the bill; and great sympathy for the unfortunate widows of our soldiers; he would be afraid to give any estimate of the additional sum that would be required if this amendment were concurred in, and therefore hoped the House would not adopt it. Let the responsibility be upon the Senate. Referred.

Mr. Holton moved a vote of thanks to the Speaker for the able and impartial manner with which he has presided over this body.

A resolution of thanks to the clerks and officers was also introduced and adopted.

Mr. Speaker Rose made a short address stating that, as was expected, there had been some little transgression of order, but that he had never seen a better behaved body of men in any assembly that he ever had a seat in. He wished them a safe return to their homes and a hearty welcome from their families.

LOCAL NEWS.

The Storm.

The storm yesterday and last night was pretty general along the entire Southern coast. There was quite a gale at Smithville, the maximum velocity being 38 miles per hour. In this city it blew a light gale, the greatest velocity of the wind being 30 miles per hour. The storm signal has been hoisted all day and at about noon the off-shore signal was hoisted, the indications pointing to westerly gales of greater force. No damage to property or shipping has thus far been reported. In this city there was quite a heavy rainfall last night which continued until about 1 o'clock this morning.
