It appears from the British trade returns that the Suez Canal, which England invested so largely in, and which she is expending immense sums to retain control of, has been a detriment to the country in a commercial point of view. The Liverpool Chamber of Commerce takes this view of the matter. 500 The reason is said to be that the canal gives the Mediterranean countries and advantage over the United Kingdom in the trade with the East, and induces them to purchase raw cotton, raw silk and their coffee direct from India. instead of having them reshipped from England. Furthermore, by shortening of the voyage to the East, much less money is required to carry on the Oriental trad e, and in this way nearly £12,000,000 of English capital has been thrown out of employment.




