 The Duke of Newcastle lingers at Jacksonville, Fla., until Spring shall come.
 A large number of boys and girls in Nashville, Tenn., are going into silk culture this Spring.
 The total losses by fire in the United States during January and February are estimated at \$17,850,000.

The reigning beauty of Ireland is a Belfast mill girl. Crowds, it is said, surround the mill daily to see her as she takes her departure.
 The Princess Dolgorouki has taken a superb mansion in Paris for two years, and proposes to live there quietly with her children, taking no notice of Russian politics.
 The average stay of servant girls in families is said to be less than seven weeks, taking the country over. In Wilmington it would hardly average seven days.
 The whipping-post for wife-beaters is to be set up in Illinois. The law not only provides that any husband who assaults his wife shall be whipped upon the bare back, but that he shall pay all costs of prosecution.

The four German officers detailed to organize the Sultan's army have, by permission from Berlin, entered the Turkish service, and fifteen Turkish officers are to join the German army for experience.
 Kansas is to have a railroad commission. The business of the commission, as outlined by an act which has just passed the Legislature, is mainly to see that the laws affecting transportation are enforced. Passenger fare is limited to three cents per mile.

The Bloomington Paragon heads its account of Judge David Davis's wedding as follows: "Bloomington's Big Judge, in Looking Over the Garden of Womanhood, Selects the Burr, Probably Because he Realizes that She Will Stick to Him Through Thick and Thin."
 Mrs. W. K. Vanderbilt's Easter ball, continues to be the topic of conversation in New York society. It is estimated that the diamonds to be displayed by the ladies on that occasion will represent a value of five million dollars. The entertainment will cost not less than fifty thousand dollars, the champagne alone costing two thousand dollars.

A bill has passed one House of the Missouri Legislature reducing the present legal rates for freight on railways in that State by 25 per cent. It is backed by what is called the Farmers' Club. The St. Louis Republican, the leading Democratic paper of Missouri, says that, through competition, freight rates are already reduced somewhat below the legal rates, and that, if the bill becomes a law, it will inflict a serious blow to the prosperity of the State.

It is said in New York that Mr. Rufus Hatch, who is now in London, has negotiated with English capitalists to purchase 3,000,000 acres of land from the Northern Pacific Railroad in Montana, and stock it with 15,000,000 worth of cattle. This has long been a pet scheme with Mr. Hatch, but he has not been able to induce New York capitalists to join him.
 The Statesville Landmark asserts that neither Judge Bennett nor Judge Ashe, while on the bench, carried free railroad passes. Is the Landmark sure where it speaks? Some years since we heard a gentleman who is sure to have been pretty well posted on the subject, remark that there was but one Judge of the Superior Court in North Carolina who did not carry a railroad pass in his pocket. We cannot blame a Judge who is compelled to ride all the circuits of the State, from Currituck to Cherokee, with a salary of only \$2,500, out of which he must not only support his family, but pay all of his own expenses, if he does as wrong there is, is properly chargeable to the niggardly policy called economy on the part of our State.
