STATE NEWS.

Newbern Nat Shell: There is always more or less railroad news floating on air now-a-days. The latest is that "A Goldboro syndicate (of business men) to lease the Atlantic Road and to purchase the Midland to Smithfield, with a view of extending it to Fayetteville, is being talked of."

Goldboro Bulletin: The ground work for the new Methodist church is being laid by Messrs Barrett & Eilstein. They have let the contract for the brick work, and showed us the plan of the building. It will be one of the finest edifices of the kind in the State, if completed according to the plan. The front and north sides will be laid with pressed brick, in putty.

Beaufort Telephone: The whaling crew at Shackelford's Banks struck a bonanza on Friday last. A school of black-fish or cow-fish, averaging about 10 feet in length, came inside the harbor and were chased ashore on the banks, ten of them being caught. The blubber was soon stripped from them, and the process of manufacture of oil commenced.

Tarboro Guide: Rev. Dr. J. W. Huffman and Rev. Mr. Munday, of the Missionary Baptist church, will begin a series of meetings in the Baptist church at this place on Monday night, the 2d day of April. Lieutenants Station and Paris will give a barbecue to the members of the Edgecombe Guards next Thursday, on the Fair Ground. A good time is anticipated. This reunion will be one step towards a reorganization of the corps.

Salisbury Examiner: A strange malady has attacked the horses hereabouts. While the Rev. Mr. Stickley was riding out the other day, his horse, a fine healthy animal, seemed suddenly to get sick, giving way in its hind parts, sweating profusely and trembling as if with a hard chill. With difficulty Mr. Stickley succeeded in leading the horse back to the stable where it lay for nearly a week being unable to stand upon its hind legs when set upon its feet, yet showing a ravenous appetite. Another horse similarly attacked was drowned with a quart of whiskey and thirty grains of quinine, and it is getting well.

Wilson Springs: Mr. Clark, who laid at death's door for so long a time, is up and out again to the delight of his many friends. While Miss Sissie Price, whose mother is living on the plantation of Miss Zillah Edmundson, was preparing dinner a few days ago, her clothes caught fire and before the flames could be extinguished she was burned in a most shocking manner. She is alive but there is no hope of her recovery. On Friday night, about 9 o'clock, while Paul Bunn was passing through the horse lot of Blake Rhodes, he walked into a well about 30 feet deep. His cries for help attracted the attention of some negroes living adjacent thereto, who came and rescued him from his watery prison. He came out not hurt, but wet and very wet.

Charlotte Journal-Observer: A runaway accident, strikingly similar to the one that happened to little Frank Stanall, near this city, a few weeks ago, occurred yesterday at Pee Dee Station, on the Carolina Central Railroad. The victim was a small negro boy. His father had been ploughing in a field, and at dinner time put the boy on the mule to ride to the house. The mule became frightened from some unknown cause and darted away. The boy was thrown from the mule's back, but in falling his foot became caught in the trace chains, and he was dragged across the field for nearly a quarter of a mile before the mule could be stopped. The little fellow was unconscious when his foot was disengaged from the chain, and the doctor, who examined his wounds, found that they were of a nature so serious as to admit of no hopes of the boy's recovery, giving the opinion that he had but a few hours to live.

Charlotte Journal: Mr. A. M. Gilmer, of Gaffney City, a wagon and buggy manufacturer who has a live trade in this city, lost all of his buildings and stock of wagons by fire a few nights since. He was fully insured. The number of mortgages made by the people of this county during the month just closed is something astonishing. An investigation of the book in the office of the Register of Deeds shows the total number recorded during March to be 463. The heaviest and largest sale of cotton ever made in this State was received at the Carolina Central depot yesterday afternoon. It took an extra number of hands to get the bale on the scales, and then the weights had to be piled on until the balance was struck, when the exact weight of the bale was found to be 1,658 pounds. The bale was packed at the press of Mr. Garibaldi in this city, and the press that did the work was made by Capt. John Wilkes.

Ancient Classics for English Readers.

Draw \$15,000.

Ticket No. 8,564 drew the \$15,000 prize in the last monthly drawing of the Louisiana State Lottery, and the Allentown papers say the ticket is held by J. Allen Schaeffer, a bookseller and a well-known business man on Seventh street, that city, who invested a dollar in the scheme, thinking never to hear from it again. Mr. Schaeffer received his first information through the newspapers, which published the numbers winning prizes on Wednesday.

The item says: "This is probably the best investment he ever made. We have heard of no one yet who begrudges him the bonanza which he has suddenly acquired, only most people regret that they are not privileged to enjoy a like fortune. Mr. Schaeffer has persevered and struggled in his business, frequently against adverse circumstances, but he kept pushing along and succeeded in building up a prosperous trade, which, with a little more capital, will be placed on a very substantial basis."

It is probable that the good luck of the Allentown man will have the effect of stirring up the interest in the Louisiana State Lottery already felt in this vicinity. We frequently hear of small gains, and these have kept alive the desire on the part of many to invest. Such a prize, as that drawn by Mr. Schaeffer, will give a new impetus to business. Whatever may be the objectionable principles of a lottery, whatever a man wins on a Louisiana State Lottery ticket he is as sure to get in full as the cash on a good check on a good bank.—Easton (Pa.) Free Press, March 16.

Schaeffer, the book man, who made the big hit in the Louisiana State Lottery the other day, got his money yesterday per Central Express Company. It wasn't much of a package, the amount consisting of three five thousand dollar bills. Mr. Schaeffer will continue in business, and says he will not allow his good fortune to spoil him one bit. On the contrary, he avows his intention never to purchase another lottery ticket and to put all his energies and all his fortune into the business which, thus far, he has made a great success out of a small beginning through hard work.—Allentown (Pa.) Chronicle and News, March 28.
