A New Company.

A new military company has been organized at Smithville. Upwards of forty names have been enrolled and an organization having been effected application has been made for arms and accoutrements. The following officers have been elected:

General Taylor.

General M. P. Taylor is an applicant for the position of Superintendent and Engineer-in-Chief made vacant on the Cape Fear & Yadkin Valley Railroad by the resignation of Col. L. C. Jones. Gen. Taylor has had a railroad experience extending through a period of 20 years and was highly recommended by General Walter Gwynn, Edward Lorraine, E. H. Gill, Col. Talcott and other distinguished engineers, under whom he had served, for the superintendency of the Wilmington & Manchester Railroad at the time General Wm. McRae was elected to the position. General Taylor commenced his career as a civil engineer in 1848 on the Richmond & Danville. R. R., on the first survey of the same, and continued on that road until its completion to Danville, when he came to North Carolina, and was resident engineer on the Wilmington & Manchester Railroad and had charge of the Great Pee Dee Bridge, where the first cast-iron cylinders were sunk by atmospheric pressure, being the same process used at the bridging of the North East and West Cape Fear. He was on the first survey of the North Carolina Railroad and there remained until the road was completed, serving afterward as Road Master on the Eastern Division from Goldsboro to Company Shops. He was employed as resident engineer on the Rabun Gap Railroad, in South Carolina, and had charge of what was known as Stump House Tunnel Division, which had a tunnel three-quarters of a mile long. He also served on the James River and Kanawha Canal under Edward Lorraine as Chief Engineer, who endorsed him as one of the best engineers he ever had under him.

Gen. Taylor served with Gen. Walter Gwynn at the time the Legislature of North Carolina appointed General G. to examine into the cost and practicability of completing the Cape Fear and Deep River locks and dams, and received a most complimentary notice at the hands of the General Assembly as the assistant of Gen. Gwynn.
Gen. Taylor's letters of commendation from the engineers already mentioned are of the most complimentary character and endorse him as a civil engineer of ability, and of them he may justly feel proud.

Sudden Death.

An old colored woman by the name of Katie McAllister, well-known to many of our people, died very suddenly last night. She had been to church during the day, and at night appeared unusually well and in excellent health and spirits, and yet, within a short half-hour of her return from church last night, she was a dead woman from a disease of the heart. Aunt Katie was a good old soul, and was highly esteemed. For a number of years past she has prepared tripe for sale, and of late had a stand in Mr. Melton's store. She was, perhaps, nearly 75 years of age.
