The New York Herald says that after all there is to be no advance in rent in that city and that there are a great number of dwellings and flats awaiting occupants.

The Georgia Democrats met yesterday in Convention for the purpose of nominating a successor to Governor Stephens. Five ballots were had without a nomination.

Poor Ireland! During the last 30 years 2,804,740 emigrants left her ports to seek their fortunes elsewhere. The population of Ireland now is only 5,400,000, and it is still on the decline.

The Louisville lottery, project, in which the Willard Hotel was the principal prize, has collapsed. Of the \$60,000 taken in for tickets, only about \$16,000 remains for division among the purchasers.

Having read that Gov. Butler had asserted that he has "no Presidential bee in his bonnet," the Boston Herald suggests that probably it is a hornet. We rather think, in view of the Tewksbury developments, that it is an insect with still another name.

Herr Most "shot off his mouth" in Philadelphia Sunday night and declared that "America wanted dynamite." So she does, so she does, Herr Most. Just enough of it, for instance, to fire off your carcass on the toe of some hard-hearted fellow's brogan.

In the Connecticut Senate the Finance Committee reported favorably a bill compelling the railroad corporations in that State to transport, free of charge, all members of the Legislature from their homes to Hartford and return during its annual sessions.

The cattle of the Pampas are computed at 20,000,000. They are the descendants of a bull and eight cows which were brought there by two Portuguese brothers in 1553. It is only near Buenos Ayres that they have been crossed with finer stock. The old herds are ill shaped and ugly.

The Memphis Avalanche has changed both its management and politics. Mr. W. H. Forrest, eldest son of the late General N. B. Forrest, is the new business manager. The Avalanche was formerly neutral in politics, but will hereafter be known as straight Democratic.

The shipment of butter from this country for ten months ending February 28, 1883, as compared with the shipments for the ten corresponding months in 1882, show a falling off of over 50 per cent. The New York Commercial Bulletin thinks the falling off is due to the holding back of producers in sending their butter to market, and that they will lose heavily in consequence. People who will speculate must take the chances of speculation.

In an article on "Type-writing and Photography," published in Harper's Bazar, in the series "How skilled work remunerates Women," the writer says: "The best private secretary is one who can write shorthand and operate a typewriter. The young woman who can write shorthand and operate a typewriter is in demand to-day, and she can reasonably expect to earn from seven hundred to nine hundred dollars a year, if, of course, she has had a good common school education."

We notice, by a letter published in the News and Observer, that the census returns have credited Chatham county with 448,000,000 feet of pipe timber against but 288,000,000 in Bladen, 141,000,000 in Brunswick, 268,000,000 in Columbus, 806,000,000 in Cumberland, 486,000,000 in Harnett, 563,000,000 in Johnston, 504,000,000 in Moore, 96,000,000 in New Hanover, 864,000,000 in Robeson and 602,000,000 in Sampson. When it is considered that Chatham is a red clay county and that one may travel for ten miles in almost any direction without a glimpse of "merchandise," the absurdity of the statement will be understood and appreciated.

The following are the numbers which drew the big prizes in the drawing of the Louisiana Lottery yesterday: 62,887, 72,592, 52,989, 36,502, 58,507, 25,335, 27,694, 50,116, 69,372, 97,878.

Capt. T. M. Emerson, General Freight and Passenger Agent of the Atlantic Coast Line, who has been very sick for the past two weeks, has again so far recovered as to be able to appear on the streets to-day.

P. G., W. M. Hayes was elected last night, representative of Cape Fear Lodge, No. 2. I. O. of O. F. to the annual meeting of the State Grand Lodge, which convenes at Raleigh on the 15th proximo.

Steamship Regulator, Capt. Doane, from New York, arrived at her wharf in this city at 10:15 this forenoon. The river was so full of rafts and flats below and above her dock that she experienced some delay and considerable difficulty in reaching her moorings, but it was finally accomplished.

Telegraph poles cost about \$1 each; the wire stretched on them costs about \$15 a mile; the cross arms cost five cents a running foot; the insulators cost two and a half cents each by the hundred for light wires, and seven to eight cents for heavy wires. With these figures anybody can figure out the cost of putting up a telegraph line, adding the cost of labor.

**City Court.**  
Alexander Evans and Cad Lowery, two colored youths, were arrested and brought before Mayor Hall this noon charged with disorderly conduct. The testimony showed that the former was not guilty, and he was discharged, while a fine of \$2 was imposed upon the latter, with the alternative of 10 days in the city prison. He went sorrowfully below.

**Severe Accident.**  
We regret to learn that Capt. B. W. Berry met with quite a severe accident yesterday afternoon which will probably confine him to the house for a while. He was engaged in raising the barque Atlantic, which was thrown on her beam ends at the Dry Dock a few days ago, when a chain parted, a fragment of which struck him on the face cutting a deep gash besides inflicting several severe bruises. Dr. Bellamy was called upon and made the patient as comfortable as possible. It was a very fortunate escape from fatal consequences.

**Unprecedented.**  
We have been informed that a few days since engine No. 31 (which was formerly known as the William A. Wright), with a record of 17 year's service, made the run from Weldon to Wilmington, 162 miles, including four stoppages, in 4 hours and 3 minutes. There were 17 minutes consumed in the stoppages, which made the actual running time 3 hours and 46 minutes. It is stated that the run was made, including a return to Burgaw, on one tender of wood. S. L. Meredith was the engineer and Capt. Newell conducted or at the time.

## Mr. Sprunt's Report.

We thank Mr. James Sprunt, retiring President of the Produce Exchange editorially and individually, for a copy of his report, submitted by him yesterday at the annual meeting of the Produce Exchange. This report is a duodecimo edition of 252 pages, which has been prepared by Mr. Sprunt during the past few weeks, and published at his own expense. It is beautifully printed, on thick paper, in clear type, and is an excellent specimen of the work turned out by the printers, Messrs. Jackson & Bell.

Of the report itself we hardly know how to speak. We do not want to say too little and we could not say too much. It is a carefully prepared, elaborate statement of almost every department or institution of public interest in this city, presenting carefully arranged details in regard to everything. Nothing seems to have been omitted and although the subjects treated of have been familiar in a general way to our minds for years yet there is much in the details that has never before been made public and which is of absorbing interest. The book is not only excellent as reading matter and reliable as to the statistics it furnishes, but it is very valuable as a book of reference and will no doubt be carefully preserved by all who may be so fortunate as to become possessors of it.

To Mr. Sprunt himself we present our warmest congratulations, for the task which his liberality and public spirit suggested to him has been faithfully and well performed. It was a really gigantic undertaking, and had it taken months instead of weeks to carry it out, even then it would have been quickly performed.

In this connection we publish here the resolutions relative to Mr. Sprunt's retirement from the office of President of the Produce Exchange, offered yesterday by his successor, Col. Roger Moore, and unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks of this Exchange are eminently due, and are hereby tendered Mr. James Sprunt for the very able and successful manner in which he has conducted the affairs of this organization during his term of office.

Resolved, further, That for his very valuable contribution, presented to the members of this body, contained in his report, "Information and Statistics Respecting Wilmington, N. C.," which is copyrighted and in book form, this Exchange and the community at large are under very great obligations; as it must prove invaluable for reference, containing, as it does, complete and reliable information of the business enterprises and resources of our city.

## The Opera House.

## Presidential Visits.

The assertion having been made by a city contemporary that no President of the United States had ever stopped in Wilmington, we are induced to record here a few facts. James Monroe visited Wilmington in 1819, Martin Van Buren, in 1840, J. Ames J. Polk in 1849, and Millard Fillmore in 1852. These two last visits come under the personal recollection of the writer, and the others are vouched for by a gentleman who recollects them well. President Polk spoke from the portico of the old Hill house, corner of Front and Dock streets, now owned and occupied by Messrs. Adrian & Volders, and President Fillmore held a reception in the parlor of the Holmes Hotel, corner Market and Front streets, now occupied by Dr. Jas. E. Kea. The last Presidential visit to Wilmington was in 1864, when President Davis spoke from the balcony of the large building on Market street, now occupied by Mrs. Moore as a boarding house and at that time by Mrs. John Walker as a private residence.

## Enjoyment.

There was not so large an audience at the Opera House last night to hear the Rev. Dr. Joseph R. Wilson discuss the above named subject as the theme, the speaker and the occasion deserved, although many of the most intelligent, refined and cultured of our people were present to be edified by the scholarly effort. In the preparation of the lecture Dr. Wilson had evidently bestowed much careful thought, although there was none of the stiffness and formality and offensiveness of pedantry in its composition. Its logic, rhetoric and diction formed a trio of exquisite harmony in which there was not a dissonant note to grate and jar upon the sensitive and delighted ear. Those who were absent missed a rich treat, and those who had the good fortune to be present were made glad by a season of "Enjoyment" of the purest and best quality for which they owe lasting gratitude to Dr. Wilson, who prepared the feast, and to the Wilmington Library Association, through whose instrumentality it was offered to our people.

## Notice

IN THE GENERAL LAWS OF THE State the chapter relating to Towns reads as follows: "Any person or persons violating any Ordinance of any City or Town of this State shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be subject to the provisions of this chapter." Now, therefore, ample notice is hereby given to all persons interested, that on the 15th day of May next, the Health Officers of the city will be required to carefully inspect and report upon the condition of all private sinks and privies, and all persons who have wilfully failed to have such privies thoroughly cleaned and disinfected, by that time will subject themselves to indictment under the above named Act. The names of the City scavengers can be ascertained by application to the Chief of Police.
