Board of Aldermen.

The Board of Aldermen met last night pursuant to adjournment, and the following were the proceedings:

The Committee on Streets, on grading Third street, removing obstructions from Front street and repairing Water street from Dock to Mulberry, were granted further time.

The adoption of the proposed ordinance concerning markets was recommended by the Committe on Markets and adopted.

The Board then made appropriations for current expenses for 1883.4 as follows: Streets and Wharves, \$10,360; Police, \$18,926; Fire Department, \$7,-681; Public Buildings, \$2,425; Feeding Prisoners, \$250; Lights, \$6,850; Stationery and Printing, \$500; Sanitary, \$2,990; Hospital, \$1,600; Water cellaneous and Extraordinary, \$1,150; Salaries and Fees, \$5,400, making a total of \$66,532 appropriated, subject to

Aldermen Fishblate, DeRosset and Chadbourn were appointed a Commit, tee by the Mayor, to investigate and report to the Board in regard to the city debt and the issuance of \$40.000 or more bonds, and in regard to the bond of the Chairman of the Sinking Fund as called for by resolution.

Mr. Logan R. Ives was elected weigher and grader of cattle.

The office of city detective was temporarly abolished. Adjourned.

The Market Matter.

The action of the Board of Aldermen at their meeting last night, in appointing Mr. Ives as Cattle Weigher for the city, excited much indignant comment to-day among the butchers, as a result of which they held a meeting and adopted resolutions, which will be found elsewhere in this issue, ealling upon the Board to rescind the appointment of Mr. Ives and give it to Mr. Those who have postoffice boxes will Heward, who is the choice of the butchers. This, we suppose, the Board will surely do, as otherwise the arrangements made with the butchers for the occupation of the new market will fall through.

It is hard to understand the action of the Board of Aldermen in this matter. It was to say the least unwise and impolite. It was wrong, as is freely attested by the terms of the agreement made between the Board and the butchers and submitted to and received by the Board of Aldermen at the meeting held by them on the night of the 2nd

The following is the clause relative to

the appointment of a cattle weigher: 4th. To appoint one inspector, to be selected by the butchers, who shall give bond as required by the Board, who shall inspect, grade, and weigh all cattle sold on the hoof; fees for which to be paid by the seller.

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED BY A CALLED MEET-ING OF THE BUTCHERS OF OUR CITY.

WHEREAS, at the meeting of the Board of Aldermen, held on the night of the 17th inst., they did elect Mr. Logan Ives to be the weigher and grader of beef cattle for our city, and whereas, we elaim that it was contrary to an understanding made between a committee consisting of Aldermen and Butchers, adopted by the Board of Aldermen; said understanding was that the Butchers were to suggest a suitable person to be confirmed by the Board of Aldermen, to be Grader and Weigher of cattle; and, whereas, we believe that such a person should be disinterested, and be a competent judge as to the quality of beef, also as to what cattle will net, according to their ranges and place of raising; also be-tweeen grass fed beef and stall fed beef; also, that he should not be a butcher nor cattle raiser; one that should be competent in every respect, because when cattle are graded by the grader there is no appeal either for the seller ortbuyer; both must abide by his judgment; that we should have a man of more experience in cattle and not interested in any way with the trade.

Resolved, That we condemn the appointment of Mr. Ives and the action of the Board in appointing him, as we believe that he is not competent to grade cattle and was not recommended by the butchers in meeting and certainly must

Resolved, That we have pledged our selves in good faith with the Board of Aldermen, believing they would go according to agreement to encourage and establish markets in our city, and to have them supplied with good healthy meats, which cannot be accomplished unless we have a competent judge to grade the same.
