Call for a Colored Convention.

WASHINGTON, April 28.—In compliance with the terms of a resolution adopted by a convention of colored people of the District of Columbia, which met in this city on Emancipation Day, a call has been issued for a national convention of colored men, to be held in Washington on the 24th of September, 1883.

Capture of Counterfeiters.

NEW YORK, April 28.—A raid on alleged counterfeiters and persons dealing in counterfeit money was made last night by special agent Drummond and U. S. Deputy Marshals Bernhard and Deuber. The following named persons were arrested: George L. Stauley, of 51 East 94th street, the alleged manufacturer of thousands of "trade" and "brand" dollars.

Commissioner Raum.

WASHINGTON, April 28.—Mr. Green B. Raum, Commissioner of Internal Revenue, to-day tendered his resignation to the President, to take effect on the 30th inst., and it has been accepted. This action on the part of Mr. Raum was occasioned simply by a desire to re-enter private life and engage in the practice of his former profession—the law.

Two Birthdays.

NEW YORK, April 28.—Queen Victoria's birthday will be celebrated on May 24 throughout Great Britain, with the exception of London, where it will be celebrated May 26. The Tribune satirically suggests that the programme is a generous one, since any body of enthusiasts can celebrate the day in the country and finish their spree in the city two days later, while Mr. Parnell and his friends do not sympathize they can stay over May 24, avoiding the celebration at their own homes, and go home in time to avoid the London celebration.

Jay Gould's Trip.

NEW YORK, April 28.—Jay Gould left the city to-day in a special car on the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western railroad for a trip west and south. He was accompanied by Russell Sage, Samuel Sloan, A. L. Hopkins, and one or two other gentlemen. The party will stop at Buffalo to-day and expect to be in Detroit to-morrow.

STATE NEWS.

Morganton Mountaineer: A practical miner, who has spent the past twelve months prospecting in Burke and Caldwell counties, says that the belt of country from the head of Lower Creek in Caldwell to the head of Irish Creek in Burke is the richest mineral belt on the continent, abounding in iron, copper, gold, and silver.

Shelby Aurora: The value of real estate has advanced in Shelby. Next month our two tobacco manufacturers will be booming and give employment to 100 persons. The trade of Shelby has increased 50 per cent in the last three years and our merchants are doing much for the advancement of this town.

Greensboro Patriot: The reported injuries to the W. N. C. R. R. have been greatly exaggerated—\$3,000 will cover all the damages. Trains ran from Asheville to Salisbury yesterday, 27th.—The Democrats in Charlotte are sure of electing Mr. Maxwell. The total registered strength of the city is 1,427 with a white majority of 359.

Asheville Citizen: Messrs. Banks and McLaughlin, of Asheville, contemplate the issue at an early day of a paper, to be called the Daily Visitor, neutral in politics, and devoted to general news.—Mr. Sidney Elford, of England, has just returned from a visit to his home, with

the determination of making Western North Carolina his home. He brings with him Mr. Frank Elford, his brother, and Messrs. H. H. Budgett and T. M. Budgett.

Charlotte Journal: Mr. B. Ludwick, of Salisbury, who went to Wadesboro some days ago with a drove of horses, was brought to the city on the Carolina Central train yesterday, on his way home, in a badly wounded condition from the kick of a horse. The animal kicked him square in the mouth, and the talk of the shoe striking the nose and breaking it. Mr. Ludwick's mouth was greatly swollen and he was suffering intensely. All his front teeth were knocked out and his jaw bone was broken. He went on home this morning.

Rutherfordton Banner: A union meeting of the several denominations has been going on for several days in Rutherfordton commencing at the Baptist, Saturday last, and alternating with the Methodist church, Rev. C. B. Justice, Rev. J. T. Abernethy and that good old Father in Israel, Rev. T. B. Justice officiating. The business houses of our town have considerably closed their doors at the ringing of the bells that all their employes might have the privilege of attending the services and there is an evident awakening among christians of all denominations, not being confined to the town limits but spreading far into the country, there being quite a number in attendance from all around us.

Newbern Journal: On Thursday night at about 11 o'clock a sailor, who came in on a schooner a few days ago, named Augustus Kore, a Swede, had his throat cut at Five Points. George Washington, colored, is charged with doing the cutting and is in jail awaiting preliminary hearing. The cutting was done with an ordinary pocket knife, and will probably prove fatal.

Among the shipments of peas on the Shenandoah on Friday was a lot of 172 boxes shipped by Jesse Brooks, one of the well to do colored farmers of this county. Jesse bought a plantation about nine years ago and promised to pay \$7,000. For a few years after making his purchase he was a county commissioner, and of course had to deal more or less with politics, and says during that time he had trouble in making his payments, but since he has quit politics he doesn't find much trouble in coming to time, and owes only about \$1,800 on his plantation. He says farming and politics won't work well together.

A story reached the city last night that a colored man had been hung by his wife and another negro man in Hyde county under the following circumstances:—The wife entered into a conspiracy with this man to get rid of her husband, and fixed a rope through the upper floor of the house while the husband was absent, and when he returned home the wife met him at the door and greeted him with kisses, and decoyed him under the hole, while the man on the upper floor dropped the noose over his head; then the wife held her husband's hands and he pulled the rope. When they thought he was dead, they took him down and dragged him off, covering him up for dead. When they had left the old fellow, like Sindbad the sailor, he scratched out. The guilty parties, hearing of his resurrection, fled to Pamlico county, where they were arrested and put in jail. This is the rumor as told by a Pamlico man last night.
