The Storm.

The storm which menaced our city all through yesterday came last night. At about 7 o'clock p. m., the storm signal was hoisted, indicating that the storm center had reached the Atlantic coast. It was not so severe in this city, however, as it was in many other ocalities, the maximum velocity of wind here reaching to 24 miles an hour. At Smithville the maximum velocity was 35 miles per hour; at Fort Macon-36 miles; at Cape Hatteras 40 miles, and at Charleston, S. C., it was 41 miles per hour. The storm centre seems to have been in the immediate vicinity of the latter city.

The rainfall in this city in the 18 hours ended at 7 a. m., to-day, amounted to 1.79 inches. At Smithville during the 8 hours ended at 7 o'clock this morning the rainfall amounted to 73-100 inches; George Alfred Townsend has bought at Fort Macon 92-100 inches, and at a house in New York with the proceeds Cape Hatteras 96-100 inches. The greatest amount of rain, however, fell in Charleston, S. C., where it was as follows: From 7, a m. to 3, p. m. yesterday, it was 1.95 inches; from 3 p. m. to 11 p. m., it was 1.92 inches and from 11 p. m. to 7 o'clock this morning it was 1.30 inches; making a total rainfall in the 18 hours ended at 7 a. m. to-day of 5.16 inches.
