A Narrow Escape.
Mrs. Elizabeth Warren, of this city, met this morning with a narrow escape from a horrible death. She was engaged in making candy at her candy store on North Second street, between Princess and Chestnut, when her clothing in some manner took fire, and in a second she was in a sheet of flame. Her cries brought her son, Mr. Archie Warren, from the front part of the store, who succeeded in smothering the flames before his mother was seriously injured, but he himself was severely burned. Much of his clothing was destroyed, and his left hand was badly burned. Dr. Potter dressed the injuries, and Mr. Warren is still able to attend to his business, and will, we trust, be all right very soon. Mrs. Warren received only a few slight burns, and her escape was almost miraculous, and was due, in an eminent degree, to the nerve and coolness displayed by her son.

Preparing for a Picnic.

Commissioners' Meeting.
The Board of Commissioners of New Hanover county met in regular monthly session this afternoon. Present, Chairman H. A. Bagg, and Commissioners Roger Moore, B. G. Worth, James A. Montgomery and E. L. Pearce.
The minutes of the last regular and special meetings were read and approved.
The Treasurer submitted his report for the month of April: General fund showing a balance on hand of \$17,734.42; and exhibited two coupons of the denomination of \$15 each, and five coupons of the denomination of \$3 each, which coupons were destroyed in the presence of the Board.
Educational fund showing a balance on hand of \$13,182.36.
The Register of Deeds submitted his regular report for the month of April showing fees collected from marriage licenses during the month to the amount of \$19.95, and exhibited the Treasurer's receipt for the same.
The Chairman exhibited the Treasurer's receipt for \$15, the same being the amount collected from Pender county on account of Zilpha Rissell, an insane pauper.

The receipts of the crop year to date foot up 134,637 bales, as against 134,766 bales to same date last year, a decrease this year of 10,129 bales.
