Gustavus Bergner, of the Bergner & Engel Brewing Company, of Philadelphia, died last Sunday.

The American exhibits in the Fishery show exceed those from the whole Continent of Europe.

Capitalists are preparing to build a grand winter hotel for Northern tourists at Pass Christian, on the Gulf of Mexico.

Mr. Joseph Medill, editor of the Chicago Tribune, has been travelling in the South all winter and has just arrived at home.

The largest steamship in the world, the Great Eastern, earned last year \$65, while \$20,000 was spent in keeping her in repair.

Professor Crouch, the composer of "Kathleen Mounreen," will have a benefit at the Baltimore Academy of Music on Decoration Day.

Senator Beck, of Kentucky, is preparing a reply to recent interviews on the subject of the tariff, had with Senators Sherman and Morrill.

Mr. Bancroft, the historian, who is a student of German affairs, thinks that Bismarck is greatly mistaken in pursuing a policy of repression.

Timothy Keating, 80 years of age, has been in the employ of a gas company in Philadelphia 47 years, and in all that time has not lost a day.

Zuckertort, who has been leading in the London chess tournament, has been beaten by Steinitz and they now stand even, with seven won games each.

A colored layman in Richmond is to debate the subject: "Be it Resolved: That Gen. U. S. Grant was a greater general and statesman than Gen. Geo. Washington."

George Hearst, the unsuccessful Democratic candidate for Governor of California, is mentioned as the coming Democratic candidate for the United States Senate.

The City Council of Beverly, New Jersey, has refused to grant licenses to hotels and saloons in that place. No licenses have been granted there for over two years.

It is estimated that 1,392,000 pounds of manufactured tobacco were shipped from Lynchburg during the past week. The revenue collections at the Lynchburg office amount to \$111,614 for the week.

The young invalid, the Duke of Newcastle, is in the Yosemite Valley. After a few weeks he will sail for China on his way to England. He has been traveling for his health for nearly a year, in America, in a very quiet way.

Pope Leo XIII has sent an autograph letter of thanks for church service to Cardinal McCloskey, of New York. It was written in Latin and sent by special messenger, and is probably the only instance where the Pope ever wrote to an American clergyman.

J. W. S. Arnold, the noted physiologist, has become a resident of Thomasville, Ga., where he has a \$30,000 laboratory. Some of the wondering natives say that he "spends two weeks studying a frog's foot through a microscope."

Mr. Keim, Civil Service Examiner, is said to be lacking in knowledge of his own language, writing English "as one of our emancipated slaves might be expected to write it, with a visible preference for sounding words and an evident misapprehension of their exact meaning."

Fifteen years ago, an enterprising Mobilian brought a little Jersey cow to that city, and was laughed at. To-day the wealthiest men in Mobile own herds of Jerseys, and it is estimated that there are nearly five thousand registered animals and numberless grades in Mobile county, worth near \$500,000.

The Chicago Inter-Ocean says the enlisted men of the United States army do not see clearly why they should not have "a retired list" after twenty-five years of faithful service. It does look as if the men who carry a gun and go about should be treated just as well as the men who ride and carry horse pistols and have an officer's commission.

Hon. Joseph E. McDonald hastens to explain that he is "in favor of a tariff for revenue; but is impossible not to have protection with that." He insists that the amount to be raised by a tariff on imports cannot for several years be reduced below \$216,000,000, and estimating the total imports at something over three hundred million dollars, he concedes that "there must be a tariff varying from thirty to one hundred per cent. ad valorem."

Crop Prospects.
