Senator Mahone would be glad to take several official scalps while here; and, unless he succeeds in securing one or two, at least, there will be some very plain talk if not something more serious.

The recent appointment of an inspector of customs at Newport News is personally objectionable to the Virginia Senator, who says that there will be trouble unless the man is removed. He declares that not only was he not consulted in regard to it, but that the person appointed is unfit for the office.

There is another officer of customs who, General Mahone says, is charged to Virginia, although he was never a citizen of that State. He wants that man removed also, or else charged to Vermont, of which State he is a citizen. Senator Mahone and the other Readjuster leaders think that the present allotment of Federal patronage in Virginia is not fair. There are five internal revenue collectors in the State, all of whom are Republicans, and two or three of them are indifferent or hostile to the anti-Bourbon movement. It is urged that two of these officers ought to be given to the Readjusters of Democratic antecedents—men whose sympathies are with the anti-Bourbon cause. It is altogether probable that some representations will be made to the President and Secretary Folger before General Mahone returns to Petersburg.

Senator Mahone and the Virginians who accompanied him to Washington say that the prospects of their party are excellent and that the county elections which will take place on the 24th inst. will result generally in favor of the anti-Bourbons.—Wash. Spec. N. Y. Tribune.
