To stimulate search a suitable reward should be offered for the discovery of Arthur's chances of receiving the nomination of his party to the Presidency.

There is a strong opinion prevalent in the South, that Hon. Abram S. Hewitt, of New York, would be the most available candidate for the presidency that the Democratic party could nominate.

Civil service reform has at all events not been adopted precipitately. It is fourteen years since Mr. Jenkins introduced the bill providing for appointments upon competitive examinations and removals only upon cause.

The Boston Herald says "if the Democrats advocated tariff reform with one-half the boldness that the Republicans display in their defense of protection, they would carry the country overwhelmingly in their favor in the next national election."

Gen. Grant is the central figure in the vast schemes of developing Mexico. He is the most popular American in that country and has the confidence of its Government. An eminent Mexican is reported to have said: "Our people all believe in Grant, and it is doubtful if he is more popular in his own country than he is in ours."

Reports received by the Comptroller of South Carolina show the following equalized value of taxable property in that State: Farm land, \$49,370,883; buildings, \$8,242,225; real estate in towns, cities and villages, \$27,771,755; personal property, including telegraph, express, insurance and railroad companies, \$60,057,449.

In 1858 the rich alluvial lands of Ashley county, in the southeastern portion of Arkansas, readily commanded from \$25 to \$50 per acre, and the uplands from \$5 to \$10 per acre, but now these lands average only about \$3 to \$15 per acre in the lowlands, and the hill lands can be bought for from \$1 to \$5. The excessive cultivation of cotton is the cause.

Notwithstanding Queen Victoria's delicate nervous condition, she drove, within an hour of her arrival at Baltimore, with the Princess Beatrice to Crathie Kirkyard, for the purpose of inspecting John Brown's grave. She has since paid a special visit to the house built for Brown at Balnagoile, which she ordered to be permanently closed. This morbid anxiety for the preservation of all relics of her late body servant is thought by many to be an evidence of mental decay on the part of the Queen.

Change of Schedule.

There will be a slight change of schedule on the Carolina Central Rail Road, commencing on Saturday, June 16th. By the change train "No. 2" will leave Charlotte Saturday evening instead of on Sunday evening, arriving in Wilmington Sunday morning, instead of Monday. The other trains will continue to run on present schedule.

Temple of Israel.

The doors and windows of the Temple of Israel in this city, are to be ornamented with metallic cornices, which are very rich and tasteful in design. They have recently been received, and will be placed in position as quickly as circumstances will permit. This ornamentation will extend to every door and window in the building, from the basement to the topmost window.

Every precaution will be used by the management to make the trip pleasant and agreeable to the excursionists. We expect that there will be a large party and that they will have a tip-top time.

Promoted.

We are glad to learn from the Savannah News, that Mr. J. B. Chesnut, formerly of this State, but for several years a resident of Savannah, Ga., has been admitted to membership in the extensive commission house of Mr. W. C. Jackson, Mr. Chesnut is a brother of Mr. George W. Chesnut, of this city, and is eminently deserving the success which has attended him. We have known him for quite a number of years and he has our heartiest congratulations.

For Conference.

Rev. Frank H. Wood, of the Front street M. E. Church, left here this evening for the Fayetteville District Conference, where he intends to spend a couple of days. Bishop Keener will preside, and Mr. Wood hopes to get him to pass a Sunday in this city before he leaves the State.

Reduction on Freight.

Capt. R. P. Paddison deserves the heartiest thanks of our people for his successful efforts in obtaining a reduction in freight rates on fruit and other articles on the Carolina Central Railroad. He is the President of the Fruit Growers' Association of the State, and has labored earnestly to secure such a reduction of freights as to permit of the transportation of fruits over the road from the Piedmont section at living rates. In this he has succeeded, and now the freight from Greensboro is \$1 per hundred pounds and from Charlotte it is 60 cents per hundred pounds. He has also secured a reduction in regular freights to 35 cents per hundred pounds.

Stolen Geese.

For a number of weeks persons living in different sections of the city, who owned geese, have been missing them, and it seemed impossible to find out what became of them. That the geese had been stolen was evident, but who was the thief? and what did he do with them? were questions not easily answered. It is estimated that nearly or quite 100 geese have been stolen since the business commenced, and it was not until within the past day or two that evidence was obtained which pointed to the thief and led to his detection and arrest.

A portion of the stolen geese were found yesterday on the premises of a family in the eastern section of the city, and the description given of the appearance of the man from whom they were bought satisfied those interested that they had gotten upon the right track, and upon their complaint Justice Gardner issued a warrant for the arrest of Robert Moore, colored, charging him with the theft. He has been fully identified by the parties to whom he had sold the geese and has, in consequence, been committed to jail to await an examination into the matter, which will take place, before Justice Gardner, on Saturday, the 16th inst.
