North Carolina Cavalry.

We find in some of our exchanges extracts from Sloan's history of the and from his sketches of the cavalry we extract the following as being of

much interest in this locality:

The officers of the Third Regiment of North Carolina Cavalry were at first all or principally elected by the troops themselves. But as accepted and finally organized by the Contederate authorities, Col. John A. Baker was assigned rapidly. But his capture at the Davis farm in June, 1864, and his characteristic course in prison, have cast a shadow on his name and fame. He never his command, which devolved on Lieut. Col. A. M. Waddell, who very soon resigned on account of ill health. Lieutenant Colonel Waddell is quite favorably mentioned in the

official reports of this date. But it was under his successor, Lieut. Col. Roger Moore, that the regiment won its highest honors. This gentleman was no trained soldier, but by mere force of character, unflinching courage and capital good sense he accomplished the best results in every kind of service. Under him two of the most brilliant dashes were made: That of Capt. Mc Clammy at White Oak Swamp in August, 1861, when he charged into the Yankee lines and brought out prisoners under the short range of musketry; and Sergt. Johnston, of Capt. 
