The police made 47 arrests during the month of June just passed, and for the following offenses: Affray, 2 white males; assault and battery, 1 colored male; attempt to rescue a prisoner from the police, 1 colored male; disorderly conduct, 6 white males, 1 white female, 15 colored males, 9 colored females; drunk, 1 colored male, 1 colored female; drunk and down, 6 white males; larceny, 1 colored male; throwing rocks in the street, 2 colored males. Total, 47.

Of this number 14 were whites, of the following nationalities: Americans 9, Germans 1, Irish 2 and Norwegians 2. The remaining 33 were colored, and were all, presumably, Americans.

Norwegian barque Rival, Captain Jorgensen, cleared to-day for Hamburg with 2,979 barrels rosin, valued at \$4-358.37, shipped by Messrs. Paterson, Downing & Co. Norwegian barquentine Haganus, Capt. Lundgren, cleared for London with 1,866 barrels rosin, valued at \$5,916, shipped also by Messrs Paterson, Downing & Co.

Mr. R. M. Sweet and wife expect to leave for Halifax, Nova Scotia, in a few days on a visit to their relatives in that place. The stockholders of the Wilmington, Clinton & Warsaw Telegraph Company held a meeting at Clinton yesterday at which the stock of the company was fully represented.

A contract was entered into for the construction of the line which is to be completed and in working order by the 20th of August next. The rules and by-laws of the Western Union Telegraph Company were adopted, with the proviso that they may be modified or changed by the Board of Directors, if, in their judgment, it should become necessary. That the prospect appears flattering may be gathered from the fact that 10 per cent premium was offered for the stock, but there were none who wished to sell.
