Daniel Shaw, Esq., of Pender county was in the city today.
There was not a bale of cotton received at this port to-day.
Nor brig *Norge*, Olsen, from this port, arrived at Liverpool on the 9th inst.
The steamship *Benefactor*, Capt. Tribon, from New York, arrived at her wharf in this city this morning.
Mayor Hall went down the river on the *Passport* this morning and passed the day in fishing at the "Rocks."
Another hot wave seems to have reached us, and it promises now to be as intense as was that of the latter portion of last week.
We regret to learn that Mr. Isaac B. Kelley, Sr., is very sick at his home in Kenansville, Duplin county, with but little hopes of his recovery.
Travel on the W. & W., and W. C. & A. Railroads is considerably on the increase and the same may be also said of the freight traffic on those roads.
Miss Maude Granger, one of the most popular actresses on the American stage, is booked for an appearance at the Opera House in this city December 5th next.
The wind was from the Northwest this forenoon but since 12 o'clock it has veered around to the South and the atmosphere is, consequently, much warmer.
Rutus Weaver, colored, in the employ of Messrs. Holmes & Watters, had the misfortune to have his foot badly mashed yesterday by a box of meat falling upon it.
Capt. V. V. Richardson, of Columbus county, is in the city to-day, and reports that the crops are in fine condition in his locality, with the grass and weeds nearly all killed.
The Family Excursion on the *Passport* this morning was well attended, there being as many on board when she left as could be well accommodated with comfort and convenience.
The *Goldboro Messenger*, of the 9th inst., copies entire an article on the Fourth of July celebration at Burgaw, from the *DAILY REVIEW*, but gives credit for the same to the *Wilmington Star*.
The steamer from New York, which arrived here this morning, had a quantity of matches as freight, and we shall not be compelled to resort to flint, steel and tinder when we want to start a fire.
The thanks of the local are due to Sheriff Manning for a fine bunch of vegetables raised in his garden, among which was a splendid specimen of beet and a bunch of onions. "Hence these tears."
Thus far this year the City Clerk has issued 326 badges for dogs, about a dozen of which, however, were duplicates. There are now not quite 1,000 that roam the streets in unbridled, unbaded and unlicensed freedom.

Talk about rapid growth, here is a specimen. A mullein plant in a garden in this city, which four weeks ago last Monday was but a few inches above the ground, has now attained a height of 8 feet. This growth is at the rate of 21 inches a week or 3 inches each day. It is almost wonderful.

At a meeting of the Wilmington Steamer Fire Engine Co., No. 1, held last night, Messrs E. G. Parmelee, W. C. VonGlabm, M. Newman, E. W. Manning and W. C. Craft were appointed a committee to confer with the members of Howard Relief Fire Engine Co., No. 1, and Wilmington Hook and Ladder Co., No. 1, relative to the reception of the Atlantic Steam Fire Engine Company, of Newbern, which propose visiting our city next week. The Howard Company meet to-morrow night and we suppose that a committee will also be appointed by them on that occasion.
We trust that the citizens generally will aid heartily in the entertainment of these visitors and we believe that they will. They have never yet been found wanting when the reputation of our old town for hospitality is to be maintained and we venture the assertion that this occasion will prove no exception to the rule.

The Fire this Forenoon.
About 11 o'clock this forenoon a fire was discovered on the second floor of the building on North Third street, opposite the City Hall, the first floor of which is occupied by Capt. Chas. D. Myers as a grocery store. The alarm was promptly given and as quickly responded to. At the first alarm Capt. Myers, who is Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, with others, ran up stairs where they found a large body of live coals on some settees, which had fallen from the floor above. The fire evidently originated on the second floor and communicated itself to the ceiling at the West end of the room, up which it had worked until it reached the third floor, through which it had burned. Streams of water from engines and hydrants were soon pouring into the burning building, and the flames were quickly extinguished.
A large hole burned through the third floor is the extent of the damage by fire, but considerable injury was done by water, especially to the good of Capt. Myers, as his store was fairly deluged. The building is the property of the Hibernian Association, and the second floor is occupied as a lodge room by the "United Order of Good Samaritans and Daughters of Samaria," who held a meeting there last night. The third floor is occupied for the same purpose by the "Knights of Wise Men." Both organizations are composed of colored people, who lost nothing except through a slight damage by water. The building is insured to the amount of \$2,000 in the Hartford Fire Ins. Co., of Hartford, Conn., and \$800 in the Commercial Union Assurance Co., of London, both of which are represented in this city by Messrs. Atkinson & Manning.

BEIRNE'S FRIENDS have been fuming and storming about the matter ever since. They recall the lavish hospitality the Baltimore clubmen have received from the Westmoreland Club of Richmond, to which Beirne belongs, and say that this affair will close the Westmoreland's doors against the Baltimore clubmen.
The membership of the Baltimore Club is largely composed of Virginians, whose feeling is that the Readjusters are a low rabble with whom the gentlemen of the State are gallantly contending. They argue that the fact that Beirne is a duelist does not take away the fact that he is a Virginia gentleman, and as such he is worthy of club privileges.
The opposition do not deny Beirne's standing in Virginia as a gentleman, but do not propose to honor a man who had just arrived from shooting down an enemy. It is understood that a meeting of the club will be held to take action in the matter. There will be some sharp speeches, and the real subject for discussion will be whether the code is still a gentlemanly institution. If the meeting fails to sustain the anti-duelists will resign, and if it does sustain them, it is said that a secession of the Virginia party may occur.
