George Knapp, senior proprietor of the St. Louis Republican, is 98 years of age.

Jay Gould and his family are afloat in their new yacht, the *Atalanta*. They were at Newport last Sunday.

Some papers have revived the rumor that ex-Senator John B. Gordon, of Georgia, is about to re-enter politics.

Cardinal Manning is seventy-three years old and became a Roman Catholic when he was forty-three years old.

It is understood that the telegraph operators have not been conciliated by the new schedule issued by the Western Union Company.

In Greece the proportion of illiterates is very high. In Thebes and Aradia only 5 per cent of the inhabitants can read and write.

A petition is being generally signed in Baltimore asking the school board to appoint colored teachers for the public schools of that city.

Dr. Mary Walker says she has received no notification of her removal from the pension office, and declares she will not be removed.

**Board of Audit and Finance.**  
The regular meeting of the Board of Audit and Finance was held at the City Hall yesterday afternoon. Present, Mr. R. J. Jones, Chairman, and Messrs. William Calder, W. R. Kenan and J. S. McEachern.

The salary of the City Attorney was fixed at \$500 per annum, to take effect from the date of his election. The recommendation of the Board of Aldermen, that the renting of the market house, on the corner of Fifth and Castle streets, be fixed at \$75 per year, the same to be put in proper condition for rental and the stalls to be rented as provided for in the market ordinances of the city, was concurred in.

Petition of the Hibernian Association to be relieved of the city tax for the year 1882 on the property recently purchased by them on the corner of the alley on Third street, opposite the city Hall, was granted.

Bond of J. W. Perdew, as Standard Keeper, for \$200, with Messrs. W. M. Poisson, L. Vollers and W. M. Parker as sureties, was accepted.

Bond of J. H. Pugh, Clerk of the Market and Cattle Weigher, for \$200, with T. P. Sykes as surety, was presented, when it was declared to be the sense of the Board that two sureties were requisite.

Bill of R. B. Clowe, for putting up 142 board signs, amounting to \$55.32, was referred to the Committee on Streets and Wharves for their approval.

Bill of R. H. Grant & Co., for putting water in the Fourth street Market House, amounting to \$60.25, was referred to the Committee on Markets and Fees for their approval.

Mr. W. R. Kenan moved that the action of the Board, in reference to the opening of Chestnut street dock, be reconsidered. The motion was adopted, Mr. Calder voting in the negative.

Mr. Jones then moved that the matter be referred back to the Board of Aldermen, with a request that they furnish information as regards the cost of opening said dock. Motion adopted, Mr. Calder voting in the negative.

Alderman Boney, Chairman of the Committee on Fire Department of the Board of Aldermen, appeared before the Board and read a communication from Capt. John L. Boatwright, Chairman of a committee of the Wilmington Steam Fire Engine Co., No. 1, asking for: 1st—a new set of harness; 2nd, that the city purchase a horse for the hose reel of the company, and 3rd, that the horse be led; but as there was no recommendation on the part of the Committee on Fire Department, and as the appropriation for the Fire Department, as approved by this Board, was recommended by the Board of Aldermen, Mr. Jones suggested to Alderman Boney that it would be proper that if any alteration is made in the appropriation for that department, a request to do so should emanate from the Board of Aldermen and that the whole matter should be laid before them.

**The Banks House.**  
Messrs. A. R. Campbell, Norwood Giles and H. McL. Greene, the committee appointed by the Carolina Yacht Club, to supervise the building of the Banks House at Wrightsville Sound, will visit that place this afternoon for the purpose of selecting a suitable site upon which to have it erected.

The frame of the building has already been prepared in this city and will be taken round to the Sound by water this afternoon.

**Federal Point.**  
Among the many pleasant attractions in the vicinity of Wilmington, Federal Point seems to be fast coming into favor for pleasure seekers and fishing parties. Mr. William Mayo has recently established a restaurant and eating house there for the accommodation of guests, and more especially for ladies and children, which adds much in its favor as a place of resort. Mrs. Mayo will have immediate care of ladies and youthful guests and will see that nothing is wanting to make a visit all that could be desired.

**Out of the Grass.**  
From a letter received from a correspondent in Caintnek township, Pender county, we learn that the farmers in that section have nearly all laid their crops by for the season. They have had a hard struggle to kill the grass, but after a long and determined effort they have succeeded. Appearances now indicate that the crops in that section will be but about half as productive as they were last year, but there is a good deal of fine growing weather between now and harvest time, during which we hope the farmers may be agreeably disappointed.

Only one bale of cotton received at this port to day.
