The number of men in the standing armies and reserves of European States is estimated at twelve millions.

Miss Celeste, daughter of Ross Williams, is said to be engaged to Mr. Hutton, a wealthy young man of the north of Ireland.

According to the estimates of Commissioner Marble, the receipts of the Patent Office for the current year will amount to \$1,200,000.

The striking telegraph operators showed good sense when they pledged themselves to indulge in no intoxicating beverages until the strike was over.

It is claimed that ex-Senator Bruce is the wealthiest colored man in this country. Among other possessions he owns two large plantations in Mississippi worth more than \$100,000 each.

The Louisiana Colored Baptist State Convention has decided to immediately send a missionary to Africa through the Baptist Foreign Mission of the United States and to push forward the missionary work in Louisiana.

John Boyle O'Reilly is now on a canoe voyage from the headwaters of the Connecticut river to Long Island Sound, in which he expects to spend ten or twelve days. At night he camps out on the river bank.

The centenary of the Bank of Ireland was celebrated on the 28th of June. Each of the officials and clerks received a bonus of 10 per cent. on his salary in honor of the occasion. The amount distributed was about £10,000.

The Western Union company operates 425,000 miles of wire, and other companies about 20,000. There are only about 12,000 miles of really private wires in the United States, less than 1,000 miles of which are in the Southern States.

Sixty of the eighty eight counties in Ohio have 8,527 saloons, paying, under the Scott law, \$1,495,172 taxes. The aggregate for the entire State is expected to reach \$1,800,000. It is estimated that 2,000 drinking places have gone out of the business on account of the tax.

The annual revenue of St. Paul's Cathedral, London, is now \$125,000. Of this sum \$10,000 is paid to the dean and \$5,000 each to the three canons in residence. The maintenance of worship in the Cathedral, independent of the stipends to the clergy, costs \$11,000 a year.

Oliver S. Taylor of Auburn, N. Y., the one surviving member of Dartmouth College's class of 1808, is now in his 100th year of life, and enjoys perfect health of mind and body. He has never been sick but a day and a nail, and has never had a headache. The one slight attack of sickness occurred some seventy-three years ago.

The returns of the county assessments in Georgia, now going in to the comptroller, show universal and gratifying gains in values. The assessment last year aggregated \$268,519,976, an increase of \$14,000,000 over previous years, and returns so far received indicate that the increase this year over last will perhaps run up to \$20,000,000. The State is paying herself out of debt and gradually reducing her rate of taxation.

The gradual decline of capital punishment in Europe is illustrated in the case of Switzerland. Eight cantons of the Swiss confederation which re-established the death clause a few years ago have not as yet inflicted the penalty in a single instance. At the same time the crime of murder has not decreased in that country, and its law-makers are getting the impression that imprisonment is the more efficacious mode of deterring and punishing at the same time.

Internal Revenue Commissioner Evans has decided that rock and rye is liquor, and not a medicine, and that its makers will have to pay a special tax as rectifiers.

One-third of the population of the Union is contained within the boundaries of five States, which form a compact section of country between the Atlantic Ocean and the Mississippi River. New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois have over seventeen million inhabitants, according to the census of 1880, and if Missouri is added to the chain, the six largest States in the Union are found to form one unbroken band. In variety of resources and business interests, as well as in strength of population, they are of themselves an empire.

Visiting Firemen. The Atlantic Steam Fire Engine Company, from Newbern, will be due here at 10:30 to-morrow morning and may be expected at about that time. They will be accompanied by a full band of music of 16 pieces. At the depot they will be met by the Howard Relief and Little Giant Companies of this city, by whom the Atlantics will be escorted to the City Hall where a cordial welcome will be extended to them by Mayor Hall. After this they will be escorted to the hall of the Howard Relief, where a collation will be in waiting for them. The visiting firemen while in the city will be the guests of the Howard Reliefs and Little Giants, which is equivalent to saying that they will be well cared for.

The Strike in Wilmington. The situation at the Western Union Telegraph office in this city seems to be unchanged. Mr. Sterling, the Manager, is still at the keys and has one operator, a stranger, who arrived here a few days since. Efforts have been made to get others but so far without success. The railroad operators have been called upon but there has been no response, made. Two men who came here last Friday to work in the office here mysteriously disappeared sometime during the night, without having reported for duty.

The Brotherhood of Telegraphers here received the following news this morning: RICHMOND, VA., July 23, 1883. Advice from the North state that we are stronger than ever. The Companies and our Executive Board are about to come together. Business completely paralyzed.

Recovered and Buried. The body of the unfortunate John Sneed rose to the surface and was discovered at about 8 o'clock yesterday morning, floating in the river, near where it was thought that he fell overboard. There is no positive knowledge as to how the accident happened, but there is a strong presumption that, oppressed with the heat, he sat down near the water, where, weary and fatigued from his night of watching, he unconsciously fell asleep and slipped overboard. The body was taken to the residence of his mother, where the obsequies took place at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, the Rev. Dr. Carmichael, of St. John's Church, officiating. His remains were interred in the family burial ground, which is located about two miles from the city, near Jumping Run.

An Outrageous Deed. We have further particulars of the drowning of the colored boy, William Bannerman, a brief account of which was given in the REVIEW, of the 19th instant, under the head of "Bladen County." It appears that on Sunday, the 15th inst., three colored boys, the largest of whom was Ned Culbreth, went to a place on South River, known as Pridgen's Landing, to swim, and that Ned took Williams, who could not swim, out into the stream and left him, saying as he swam to the shore, "Now, d—n you, swim or drown!" The boy was drowned and his body was not recovered until the next day, when an inquest was held, and the verdict of the jury was that "the deceased came to his death by drowning, at the hands of one Ned Culbreth." The latter has fled from that section, but it is to be hoped that he may be captured and have meted out to him that justice his outrageous crime demands.
