#### PHOSPHATES.

An Important Find - Major Young Discovers Phosphates in Duplin and Pender Counties.

Maj. W. L. Young writes us from Kenansville, in this State, of some very important discoveries in the way of phosphates, which he has found in the two counties of Pender and New Han over. We judge from what he says that the find is an important one, and Rare Chance to Visit Washingwe think that a thorough overhauling of the lands and an investigation into the depth and extent of the deposits should be made at once. Maj. Young is very explicit in telling of the discoveries, and we publish the letter herewith:

KENANSVILLE, N. C., Aug. 2, 1883.

EDITOR REVIEW:-Dear Sir:-I have discovered several large beds of what I take to be phos- registered letter or money order. phate. In one of the tributary basins of Maxwell Swamp, there are two de: posits on the land of Wm Kornegay; in one of the deposits, it shows for three

rine mud. The phosphate looks and appears to be in character precisely the same as the kind dredged up from the bed of the Stono river, in South Carolina, and is entirely free from carbonate of lime.
