Mr. Gladstone is out of pocket \$100,000 in Confederate bonds. Peaches in Alabama are plentiful, cheap, and fine in quality. Senator Bayard and Hon. Perry Belmont were tendered a public reception at Frankfort, Ky., Friday evening. The death of Montgomery Blair leaves General Simon Cameron the only survivor of Lincoln's war cabinet. The bitterest opponents of negro suffrage in Washington are Republicans, who kick against its reimposition there. Monsignor Capel excites much curiosity as the man who converted the Marquis of Bute and the Marquis of Ripon. The New York Times is trying to find out upon what same pretext the President maintains the alliance with Mexico.

Augusta Chronicle: There is no doubt that the temperance cause is prospering in Georgia. High license and local option are the proper remedies. Incendiarism is rampant in Newberry, S. C. Two weeks ago a disastrous fire occurred, and Thursday night an attempt was made to burn the hotel. A club of a hundred members was organized in Pottsville, Penn., to introduce knee-breeches. When the small clothes came, none of the hundred dared wear them. Great Britain is trying to negotiate a commercial treaty with Mexico, and hopes to see the pending treaty between the United States and Mexico rejected when it comes up for ratification.

The Kentucky State election occurs to day. But little interest is felt in it, however, because nobody has any doubts about the result. Proctor Knott will be the next Governor of Kentucky. The World says that one circumstance settles the question of Dorsey's veracity. It is that not one of the people implicated in his testimony has dared to contradict him or to call on him for proof. Senator Vest declares against the enforcement of the Sunday laws. He explains that "rest, sunshine, the open air and music humanize men and make them better citizens of a great, free, liberal republic."

It seems, from recent disclosures, that many mothers, no doubt ignorantly, murder or injure their little ones with soothing syrups, some of which contain powerful doses of morphine. Beware of them! After resigning the Presidency, liberating his own slaves and buying the freedom of 1,000 others with a million dollars voted him, he became the victim of ingratitude and died heartbroken in 1830.

General Robert Toombs' home in Georgia is in charge of his old man "Billy," who was with General Toombs in the Indian wars and cooked for him during the civil war. "Billy" is 84 years old, refuses to vote, has never accepted his freedom and stoutly insists that he still belongs to his "ole master."

Tarboro Guide: The Hotel Brunswick at Smithville and Seaside Hotel at Wrightsville sound near Wilmington are fast becoming the most popular summer resorts of the Atlantic coast. The clever proprietor of the Purcell House at Wilmington is mine host of both the former hotels and has the well merited reputation of keeping them up to a first class standing.

Rain Needed. There is no mistaking the fact that the crops on the line of the Wilmington & Weldon Railroad have been suffering for rain, so much in some instances as to seriously reduce the amount to be harvested. Especially is this the case on high and dry lands. It is to be hoped that the showers which began to fall yesterday have visited the sections indicated.

Criminal Court. The August term of this tribunal convened at the Court House, to day, Judge Meares, presiding. The day was consumed in drawing and empanneling the Grand Jury to whom the Judge was delivering his charge as our report closed. The following constitute the Grand Jury: Samuel Davis, foreman, and W. A. Cumming, A. M. Chadwick, Wm. Goodman, Henry Shepherd, Joseph Jones, C. S. Love, Julius Evans, J. H. Hanby, J. F. Gilbert, Jesse Ives, Allison Alderman, M. G. Chadwick, Gibson Register, John A. Holt, George Sloan, W. J. Kellogg and R. S. Hutchins.

Sunday Morning's Fire. A few moments after 12 o'clock on Sunday morning a fire was discovered in the store of Mr. John H. Strauss, on the Northeast Corner of Water and Chestnut streets, and the alarm was promptly given and the fire department quickly on hand. Several streams of water were soon pouring into the flames which were soon extinguished, but not until a considerable amount of damage had been done. By the vigorous efforts of the fire department the flames were kept from spreading to the valuable property in the immediate vicinity. There was nearly as much damage to the stock by water as by fire. It is not known how the fire originated. Mr. Strauss had his stock insured to the amount of \$1,000, in the Hartford Insurance Co., represented in this city by Messrs. Atkinson & Manning. The building, which is the property of Mr. John L. Holmes, is insured for \$1,000 in the Fire Association, of Philadelphia, represented here by Messrs. John W. Gordon & Bro. The damage to the building is fully covered by insurance, but that on the stock has not yet been ascertained. To Builders and others—Go to JACOBI'S for Sash, Blinds and Doors, Glass &c. Joint Meeting of Justices and County Commissioners. The Board of Justices of New Hanover county meet in annual session at 10 o'clock this forenoon, John S. James, Esq., in the Chair. There were 30 Justices present. The Chairman announced that the first business of the meeting would be to organize by electing a Chairman and Secretary. John S. James, Esq., was nominated for Chairman, but he declined a re-election. W. W. Harris, Esq., was then placed in nomination, and was elected by acclamation. John Cowan, Esq., was nominated and was elected by acclamation. The meeting being duly organized, the County Commissioners were notified that the Justices were ready to receive them. At the joint meeting there was a full Board of County Commissioners. Mr. H. A. Bagg, Chairman of the Board, addressed the joint meeting in regard to the business before them, and reading the estimates submitted by the County Commissioners, embracing the following tax levy: Estimated—For Criminal Court, \$8,250; Superior Court, \$850; Commissioners, \$750; Coroner, \$130; Justices of the Peace, \$640; Constables, \$325; Register, \$450; Advertising, \$125; Incidental, \$1,300; Roads and Bridges, \$450; Superintendent of Health, \$900; Poor House, \$3,000; Out Door Poor, \$2,500; Hospital, \$1,500; Jail, \$2,025; Public Buildings, \$500; Printing and Stationery, \$375; Tax Listing, \$1,050; Attorney, \$500; Assessors, \$400; Tax on property purchased by County and paid to State, \$1,200. Total \$27,220. To meet this, it is recommended that the following levy be made on property: Real and Personal—For General Expenses, on \$100, 20 1/2 cts; Criminal Court, on \$100, 15 cts; Hospital, on \$100, 2 cts. Total on property, 37 1/2 cts. And on the Poll—For General Expenses, 6 1/4 cts; Criminal Court, 45 cts; Hospital 6 cts. Total on poll \$1.12 1/2 cts. It is estimated that this levy on property and on income and franchise will realize net, \$30,500; from Schedule B and C, \$4,800; from 25 per cent on Poll Tax, \$1,000. Total \$36,300. With this levy the whole tax will be as follows: For County on property, 37 1/2 cts; State on property, 37 1/2 cts. Total 75 cts. On poll on County, \$1.12 1/2; on poll for State, \$1.12 1/2. Total \$2.25. It was moved that the tax levy be received and adopted, which was carried unanimously. The Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners then submitted his report, as follows: WILMINGTON, N. C., Aug. 3, '83. To the Worshipful, the Justices of the Peace for the County of New Hanover: GENTLEMEN—As Chairman of the Board of Commissioners for New Hanover County, I submit to your worship a short and explicit statement of the finances of the county, the condition of the county property, &c. At your last meeting the bonded debt of the county was \$15,800. Since that time the said debt has been reduced \$9,700, leaving the bonded debt of the county \$6,100. To meet part of the interest on said debt, it was thought advisable to place \$6,500 on certificate of deposit, in one of the banks. An order was therefore passed by the Board of Commissioners, instructing him to carry out the wishes of the Board. In a communication, received August 1st, he advised the Board as follows: "Your communication of the 27th inst., to hand. As ordered therein, I have placed on interest, at the rate of four per cent, per annum, the sum of six thousand and five hundred dollars, with the First National Bank of Wilmington, holding their certificate for same, payable to my order as treasurer."

The bonded debt of the county bears interest at the rate of six per cent, per annum, and the certificate of deposit at the rate of four per cent, per annum, which interest (within \$106) pays the interest on the bonded debt. By the action of the last Legislature, the Commissioners are not allowed to levy a tax on retail liquor dealers, which lessens this source of revenue to the county \$4,000. Also the tax on liquors has been reduced from ten per cent to one tenth of one per cent, and including the tax on merchandise, which has fallen off from \$7,052, to \$4,799, you have the loss in revenue to the county as follows: Retail liquor dealers \$4,000. Schedule B, \$2,252. Total \$6,252. Amount of money on hand at this time is \$7,700.30, from which take \$1,000, to be used in building an addition to the hospital, and \$1,000, the difference between the tax levy and the amount estimated to be realized from tax on property and poll, and it leaves a net balance of \$5,700.30, which amount will be sufficient to meet county expenses until the money realized from the present tax levy shall be available. The property of the county is in first class condition, and I think it will repay any one or all of your worship to visit the poor house property and see what a great change can be effected by the judicious use of paint and whitewash. The improvement is so apparent that one having seen it five years since would not recognize it as the same property. The jail roof is being thoroughly over hauled, repaired and painted, and during the past year a permanent and substantial stonewall has been built on the East side of the jail yard. Other property of the county is in good repair and carefully looked after. A detailed statement of the estimated expenditures for the next fiscal year, and the levy necessary to meet the same, having been furnished each of your worship, a more extended report is not necessary. It was moved that the report be received and spread upon the minutes. This motion, together with an amendment that the report was deemed satisfactory, was adopted. E. D. Hall, Esq., offered the following resolution, which was adopted: Resolved, That the thanks of the Board of Justices of the county are due and are hereby tendered to the County Commissioners for the able manner in which they have conducted the affairs of the county, and we are satisfied that the admirable state of the county finances must be a source of gratification to the tax payers generally. Adjourned.
