Queen Victoria is said to have been very much affected by the Princess Beatrice's recent departure for the Continent for a month's visit, as the mother and daughter have never before been separated longer than two days.

Mrs. Abram S. Hewitt had made for her just before her departure for Europe, a large cameo portrait of her father, the late Peter Cooper. It is oval, about two inches in diameter, and was made by the artist Zoeliner.

Rear Admiral Hughes has reported to the navy department that the yellow fever seemed to be decreasing in both Callao and Lima, but that it was difficult to get reliable information as to the true state of health of either city.

Impartial observers predict that Iowa will prove a doubtful State, because of Prohibition fanaticism. If it were not for so many holding-over Senators, the Democrats would probably carry the Legislature and elect a United States Senator.

Ex-United States Senator John P. King of Georgia, who entered the Senate in 1883, is spending the Summer in the Mountain region of the Northwestern section of this State. He was thirty-four years of age when he became Senator, and only served three months.

At the burial of Dr. Strain, Roman Catholic Archbishop of Edinburgh, a pageant was witnessed such as Scotland had not seen since the Reformation. There were 150 priests, and the multitude of Franciscans, Benedictines, Redemptorists, Vincentians, acolytes and nuns made up a picture that was irresistibly suggestive of some old church scene of medieval days.

The collector at Portland, Maine, having telegraphed the treasury department that he expected that an attempt would be made to land at that port a cargo of rags from Egypt, Assistant Secretary French instructed the collector not to allow them to be unloaded, until the board of health gave a certificate that such action would not endanger the health of the city.

The Minnesota Democratic State convention met at St. Paul last Thursday. The following nominations were made: For Governor, W. W. McNair; for Lieutenant-Governor, R. L. Frazee; Secretary of State, J. J. Green; Treasurer, John Ludwig; Attorney-General, J. W. Willis; Railroad Commissioner, L. Lildholm. Anti-prohibition resolutions were passed. The platform declares for a tariff revenue only, and approves the river and harbor bill.

Abram Austin, colored, whose case for a violation of the market ordinance, was continued yesterday, was fined \$1 for the offense. This was the only case before the Mayor this morning.

The annual "Farmers' Dinner," which is a notable event in Sampson county, will take place this year at Clinton on the 10th inst. Hon. D. H. McLean, of Harnett county, will deliver the address on that occasion.

Yesterday evening Mr. John Mathis was found a short distance from Clinton, lying across the shafts of his buggy dead, with his neck broken. He had been in Clinton during the day and had started for his home, a few miles in the country, and it is supposed that by some accident he was thrown out with fatal results. He was about 60 years of age.

Criminal Court.
The cases heard before this tribunal to-day were unimportant and not interesting to the general public. The most of them were settled by the payment of the costs. Meeting of the Board of Aldermen.

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Aldermen was held at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon; present, His Honor Mayor Hall, and Aldermen Dudley, Boney, Bear, Guyer, Sweet, and Howe.

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred the petition of O. G. Parsley, in reference to damage to his property on Third and Ann streets, recommended that the matter be referred to a committee of arbitration.

Alderman Bear offered the following: Inasmuch as the Board is not satisfactorily informed upon the legality of the claim, and in the absence of further information, I therefore move that the report be referred back to the committee on Finance and the City Attorney to ascertain the liability of the city in the premises; and that the committee be empowered to employ a competent mechanic to estimate upon the cost of repairing the work, which damage in the opinion of the City Attorney the city is liable for.

On motion of Alderman Howe, the use of the City Hall was granted to Queen Esther Lodge, Good Samaritans, for last night, free of charge.

And election was had to fill a vacancy on the police, and Jeff. Mote received the largest number of votes.

On motion, the Police Committee was authorized to advertise for winter uniforms for the police force.

On motion of Alderman Bear, the Committee on Streets and Wharves was empowered to regulate the matter of the erection of awnings.

The Committee on Streets and Wharves, to whom was referred a resolution to ascertain and report what, if any, legislation is necessary to prevent obstructions to sidewalks by awnings, awning posts, boxes, stands or otherwise, report as follows:

"We find an abundance of legislation to prevent obstructions to sidewalks by awnings."

The matter of the ordinance in regard to docks was, on motion of Alderman Bear, postponed until the meeting in September.

It was resolved that the committee on Streets and Wharves be directed to examine Sixth street bridge and take such action as they may deem proper to repair the same.

On motion of Alderman Boney, it was resolved that the committee on Streets and Wharves be empowered to employ the City Surveyor on all work to be done on streets and sidewalks and drainage, which requires his services; provided, however, that they cannot employ him for more than two jobs in advance of the work.

The report of the committee on Sinking Fund was referred to the committee on Finance.

A communication from the Board of Audit and Finance, in regard to Chestnut street dock, was read, when, on motion of Alderman Bear, the Mayor was instructed to advertise in the two daily newspapers for estimates.

The petition of H. Webb, Jr., and others, in regard to bathing in the river between Princess and Mulberry, was, on motion granted, provided they wear bathing suits.

A petition of John M. Bremer, to erect a wooden building on the corner of Front and Ann streets was granted.

Petition of F. A. Newbury, for the erection of a wooden building on Mulberry, between Front and Water streets, was granted.

A petition in regard to extending certain telephone lines was granted.

A resolution instructing the Chief of the Fire Department to disband the Stedman Bucket Company and take charge of any of the property of the city they may have in their possession was adopted, the said company not having attended any fires in the past six months.

The committee on Fire Department submitted a report that the three steam fire engine companies be retained, that the Bianca Hose Reel Company be organized and equipped, and that they be furnished with the truck house on Nun between Fourth and Fifth streets; asking further time in regard to more hydrants; recommending that the petitions of C. Stemmerman, to make alterations in his stables, be granted; that the old pump, corner Third and Nunn streets, be removed and the old well be filled up; that a reel horse and swinging harness be purchased for the Little Giant Engine Company, and that swinging harness be purchased for the Howard Relief and Cape Fear Companies, when they make application for the same. Report adopted.

It was ordered that oil lamps be

placed at the corners of Sixth and Seventh and Campbell streets.

Petition of citizens in regard to importation of second hand clothing was referred to the Sanitary Committee in connection with the Board of Health.

A communication in regard to the floating warehouse was read, and, on motion, the ordinance passed at the last meeting in reference thereto was repealed.

On motion of Alderman Bear, it was resolved that the committee on Streets and Wharves be instructed to report to the next meeting of the Board of Aldermen what would be the cost of paving North Water street, from Mulberry to Market, with the most improved blocks.

BOARD OF AUDIT AND FINANCE.
At a regular meeting of the Board of Audit and Finance, present—R. J. Jones, chairman, and Messrs. Wm. Calder, W. R. Kenan and J. S. McEachern—the following proceedings were had:

The bond of John H. Pugh, as Clerk of the Market and Cattle Weigher, in the sum of \$200, was accepted.

The contract awarded by the Board of Aldermen to Geo. Honnet, for keeping the city clock for one year from the 1st of August, for the sum of \$100, was approved.

The resolution of the Board of Aldermen in regard to the purchase of swinging harness and reel horse for the Little Giant Engine Company, and swinging harness for the Howard Relief and Cape Fear Engine Companies, when they make application for the same, was approved.

Commissioners' Meeting.
The Board of Commissioners for the county of New Hanover, met in regular monthly session yesterday afternoon.

The Treasurer submitted his report for the month of July: General Fund, balance on hand, \$7,700.20, with an additional fund of \$6,500 on special deposit in the First National Bank of Wilmington, to the order of Owen Burney, Treasurer. Exhibited 36 coupons of \$3 each, which were burned in the presence of the Board. Educational Fund, showing a balance on hand of \$11,752.78.

The Register of Deeds submitted his monthly report of fees received for marriage licenses, amounting to \$17.10, and exhibited the Treasurer's receipt for the same.

The Chairman reported \$45.30, collected from the Treasurer of Pender county on account of Zilpha Russell, insane pauper, and exhibited the Treasurer's receipt for the same.

Ordered that the Sheriff be paid 25 cents per day for feeding prisoners in the county jail, instead of 30 cents per day, as now allowed, the same to take effect August 1st, 1883.

Ordered that H. P. Ange be allowed to list his taxes—property known as "Silver Stream."

The petition of John W. Galloway to place lightning rods on the county buildings was not granted.

The petition of A. J. Grady and others to levy a special tax for school purposes for white schools in school district No. 6, was granted.

Board adjourned subject to the call of the Chairman.
