## LOCAL NEWS.

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STATEMENT Union Mutual Life Insurance Company

There were 20 deaths last week in Havana from yellow fever.  
Within twelve months from to-day how the political cauldron will boil!  
There are 1,000 guests at the White Sulphur Springs, the most of them from the North and the West.  
Mr. C. E. Chaddock, the father of Capt. Webb's widow, has arrived in this country, for the purpose of taking his daughter and her children back to England with him.  
The greatest hydraulic engineers in the world endorse the practicability of building a ship railway. Sir Wm. Armstrong goes to the extent of predicting that ship railways will ultimately supplant canals.  
And still another fool-hardy individual is to court death at Niagara. Capt. Julius D. Rhodes, a well known diver and swimmer, is to make the attempt, this afternoon, to pass through the rapids in a suit of cork armor.

An agent of the treasury department now at San Francisco says that during the past ten years \$6,000,000 worth of opium has been smuggled into that port and that the smugglers have been assisted by corrupt customs officials, who have received 30 per cent. of the profits.  
About 150 members of the Ohio Lumber Dealers' Protective Association met in Toledo last week to organize for the fall political campaign. In his opening address the president arraigned the republican party for its misdeeds and bitterly denounced the Scott law.  
In regard to the cholera, a dispatch from Alexandria says:  
English doctors now here, who have experience in India cholera epidemics, report that a distinctly different character from the Asiatic cholera. The report that the plague had broken out in Damietta is officially denied.

The crop reports from Virginia are discouraging. Advices from Petersburg under date of August 10th, say:  
Reports received from different counties throughout the State are to the effect that the crops are suffering greatly for want of rain. In some sections no rain has fallen for six weeks and corn is burning up. The indications point to a crop far short of that of last year.  
Philadelphia Times: "The internal revenue system was established to aid in paying the expenses of the war. The war being over and the war debt more than half paid and the balance funded out of immediate reach, there is no longer excuse for maintaining war taxes. A surplus revenue only promotes extravagance, and the way to dispose of the surplus is to raise no more revenue than is needed. The war tax must go."

The Montgomery Advertiser says Northern visitors there "frequently express surprise, when they go into our hardware and agricultural furnishing stores, to find that everything is brought from abroad." From a farm wagon to a shoe peg, from a grain separator to a clothes pin, from a mowing machine to a gimlet handle, throughout the entire range of a farm, shop and household articles, there is hardly one that does not bear the imprint of a Northern shop. There is a tremendous sermon in this, but a sermon that falls on unheeding ears.
