Denster, the Milwaukee Congressman, is said to be the coming Democratic nominee for Governor of Wisconsin.

Congressman William D. Kelley of Philadelphia, is in Brighton, England, and is reported to be in improved health.

Sir Harry Parkes, the Governor of New South Wales, and Archibald Forbes, the noted correspondent, arrived at San Francisco from Australia on Tuesday.

President Arthur went to Kansas twenty-seven years ago to look up a site to start a law office, but could not find one to suit him and returned to New York.

The net receipts of the recent mill between Sullivan and Slade, in New York, were \$11,000 after paying all expenses, of which Sullivan received \$7,000 and Slade \$4,000.

A magnificent column of gray marble, with bas relief, has been dug up in Rome. It belonged to the Temple of Serapis, and it is hoped to excavate the whole temple.

The Shah of Persia is on a pilgrimage to the shrine of Imam Riza at Mashhad, accompanied by not less than 10,000 soldiers, courtiers, servants and camp followers.

Mr. George C. Gorham, stalwart, says that the South is no more in the Union than Japan is, and that all the Union has done for her is to have given her a mail service.

The discovery of a deposit of tin in the Blue Ridge, between Amherst and Rockbridge counties, is reliably reported. If so, it is the first of the kind yet made in the United States.

Senator Don Cameron is deriving great benefit from his treatment by an English surgeon. But he writes that he is compelled to totally abstain from the use of champagne. Poor Don!

The Boston Globe says a man worth \$350,000 died in Lowell not long ago. An inventory made of his estate contained these items: Household furniture \$200, two horses \$75, carriage \$25.

Major Isaac Shelby has presented to the State of Kentucky a gold medal which was given by Congress to his father, Isaac Shelby, the first governor of the State, for meritorious conduct in battle.

The steamship City of Rome, of the Anchor Line, arrived at New York last Thursday, having made the fastest time on record, coming from Queenstown to New York. Her time was 6 days, 20 hours and 20 minutes.

Mrs. Fannie Sprague, the mother of the ex-Governor, has accepted an offer of the Union Company of Providence, which bought her homestead, to lease it to her during life at \$1 per month. She accepts upon the advice of Governor Butler, her counsel.

Thomas Jefferson's mother is to have a new granite monument over her grave at Charlottesville, Va. The monument bears this inscription: "Jane Randolph, wife of Peter Jefferson and mother of Thomas Jefferson. Born in London, 1720. Died at Monticello, 1776."

It is said that the European volunteer committee in Alexandria discovered that a canal supplying a crowded quarter of the city with drinking water communicated with a place in a native cemetery used for washing corpses.

Prince Bismarck passes his time at Friedrichsruhe in directing the improvements on his farm. He spends five or six hours a day in the open air, and gives orders to his workmen as though they were mere secretaries of State.

The Mexican financier states that a vein of ore has been struck in San Augustine mine, at Catorce, San Luis Potosi, which yields about \$16,000 a ton. This mine has long been distinguished for the great treasures it has produced.

George Whitfield, the famous preacher, is buried beneath the pulpit of the old Presbyterian Church in Newburyport, Mass. Probably none of Mr. Whitfield's relatives had ever visited the tomb until last week, when Mrs. Walsh of Savannah, Ga., a grandniece of the distinguished divine, went to the church, handled reverently the Bible from which her ancestor preached, and visited the tomb where his remains lie.
