## THE FRUIT FAIR.

**SECOND DAY.**  
Since our report closed yesterday evening a great many and very notable additions have been made to the display of fruits and flowers in the Exhibition Hall. Prominent among them is the New Hanover table, which has been materially improved in appearance by the addition of a fine display of peaches. Other tables had been arranged and fruits and flowers added to them until the new features of the hall presented a picture as pleasing to the beholder as was that of yesterday. Among other beauties, we noticed some remarkably fine and luscious-looking Bartlett pears, which were exhibited by Richard Bradley, Esq., and were raised upon his place at the Sound. In the Duplin county exhibit were samples of syrups made by Capt. R. M. Middleton, from cane raised by him in Wasaw township. Capt. Middleton has an experience of several years in the cultivation of cane and the manufacture of syrups, and has been eminently successful, and has demonstrated that this industry can be pursued with success and profit, with ordinary care and the exercise of common intelligence. We are glad to know that the agriculturists of his section are making experiments in the same direction, and that their efforts have been crowned with success.

Among other beauties which the hall presented, a description of which we were compelled to omit yesterday, was a floral shield, the ground work of which was composed entirely of China asters, bordered by various sorts of flowers and vines, and in the center of which was artistically wrought, in purple everlasting, or grass flowers, the legend, Welcome, F. G. A., N. C. It was a fine and skillful piece of work and elicited many favorable comments from the visitors. It was exhibited by Mrs. H. Webb, whose artistic handiwork prepared it for the occasion. There were also some of the finest and largest specimens of watermelons we have ever seen, a portion of which were exhibited by Maj. C. W. McClammy and the others by Mr. Newton Alderman, of Pender county. There was also a bunch of bananas, grown in the garden of St. Mark's Hotel, Jacksonville, Fla. Aside from those we have named there were almost numberless exhibits of apples, pears, peaches, grapes, plums &c. which we would gladly notice as in all respects worthy, but space forbids.

At 11 o'clock this morning, Capt. R. P. Paddison, President of the Association, called the meeting to order and announced that the first duty of the day was to name the several committees on awards, in order that they might proceed with and complete their respective duties. The articles exhibited were divided into four classes to each of which was assigned a special committee, who examined the various articles embraced in their class, decided which in their opinion was the best and made their report accordingly. The following were the committees appointed:

At 12 o'clock, noon, Mr. J. Van Lindley, one of the Vice Presidents of the Association, in a brief, neat and appropriate speech, introduced to the audience Mr. R. W. Best, of the National Board of Agriculture, who delivered an address on the "supply and demand of the fruit trade in fourteen of the different cities of the United States." It was an address replete with wise words and good, practical common-sense teachings and advice, and was listened to with profound interest and attention by the audience. It cannot fail to be of advantage to the people, and ought to have been heard

by every citizen of North Carolina.—Mr. Best is himself a Carolinian, and he feels a just and noble pride in her welfare, progress and prosperity, and by precept and example would stimulate her sons and daughters to emulate each other in every movement tending to advance her material interests and make her the peer, if not the superior, of any of her sister States. His effort to-day looked to that as the objective point of all the citizens of the State, and we feel confident that his words will be productive of much good.

## The Opera House.

There have been some very important changes made in the Opera House within the last few days, some of which were suggested by the Fair, and which it took but a short time to have effected. The chairs in the parquette have been removed for the time and a floor, constructed in sections so that it can be put down or taken up at pleasure, has been placed there and was used last night for the first time, as a dancing hall. By this arrangement the largest and most convenient hall, both for dancing and the convenience of spectators, is obtained. A row of gas jets has been placed over the Opera House entrance which presents a very fine appearance even in the day time, and when lighted at night will make an elegant display as well as prove a grand convenience to our theatre-going public. The jets were put up under the supervision of Messrs. R. H. Grant & Co., and are protected from wind and weather by glass globes of a pretty pattern. By these changes the Opera House can be made available at short notice, either for dancing, lectures or theatrical representations.

## A Revolting Case.

By passengers arriving here this morning on the Carolina Central R. R. we learn of the arrest on the upper line of the road, on Tuesday, of a colored man and a white girl who had eloped together from Keyser, on the R. & A. L., on Monday night. The man is named Frank Hollman and the girl is the daughter of Mr. Eli McLeod, a very respectable citizen, and a turpentine man at Keyser. Hollman had been employed by Mr. M. Leod and on Monday last was paid off by him, receiving a considerable amount of money. That night he disappeared and the girl was also found on Friday morning to be missing. They were found at Mathews, on Tuesday afternoon, and the girl was taken into custody and Hollman fled but was captured afterwards near Charlotte. The parties were brought down the road last night and were met at hamlet by a party who took them on to Keyser where there was some talk of getting up a necktie party this morning.

Hollman is represented as a black, full blooded African while the girl is said to be but 16 years of age, although she appears to be at least 20. She is an ordinary-looking girl and not very pretty. She says, we understand, that it was her fault, while Hollman is just as generous, and says that he persuaded the girl to elope with him. No evidences of intimacy between the pair had been noticed previous to their elopement.
