Rev. E. A. Yates, D. D., preached at the Front Street M. E. church yesterday morning to a large audience who speak in the highest praise of his discourse.

Mr. John Haar, Jr., proprietor of the Mozart Saloon, is having fitted up a bowling alley in connection with his house. It is in the rear of the saloon and will be the first alley that has been open in Wilmington in five years or more.

The Fifth Street M. E. Church has recently been repainted in the inside, the plastering, which had fallen off in some places, has been repaired and new carpets laid in the aisles, very much improving the interior appearance of the building.

### The State Fair.

We have received the premium list of the next State Fair which is to be held at Raleigh on the 15th, 16th, 17th, 18th, 19th and 20th of October. Over \$6,000 in premiums have been offered, and the railroads in the State will carry articles for Exhibition free of charge. The premium offered for the largest yield of cotton per acre from five acres is \$50, \$30 and \$20, a 450 pound bale to be exhibited in each case. For the largest yield of corn from five acres, one bushel to be exhibited, \$50, \$30 and \$20. Required statements and certificates to be furnished.

### Ingenious Workmanship.

Mr. E. V. McKenzie, of this city, but now employed at the shops of the W. C. & A. R. R., at Florence, S. C., has just completed a work-box that is a marvel of ingenuity. The box is 12 1/2 inches long by 8 1/2 inches in width, and is constructed of different sorts of woods, of which there are in all 1,250 pieces. The woods used were holly, rosewood, curled maple, mahogany, black walnut and white cedar, and they were shaped and fitted together with no other tool than a common pocket knife. It was made at night, after his regular working hours, and has taken about three months in its completion. The pieces of wood are inlaid in such a manner as to represent a pretty arrangement of flowers. The box was lined with silk, which was also the work of Mr. McKenzie, and was designed as a birthday present to a young lady of this city.

### The Recent Rains.

The storm of Saturday night extended over a large area of country, reaching from Fair Bluff, Columbus county, on the W. C. & A. R. R. to Warsaw, Duplin county, on the W. & W. R. R., and as far West from here as Shelby. In this city there was drenching rain, accompanied by considerable thunder and lightning. One flash of lightning—and the only one in this immediate vicinity—struck a telegraph pole at the Southwest intersection of Nutt and Red Cross streets, near the Champion Compress Co.'s building, and descended a wire leading into the ground and buried itself without doing any damage to person or property, further than making a hole in the ground large enough for a man's head, but which was soon filled up by the wash of sand caused by the rain. The rainfall in this city for the 24 hours ended at 5 p. m. yesterday amounted to 3 7/8-100 inches.

There were suiut showers along the line of the Cape Fear, and the river was beginning to feel its influence when the boats left on Saturday, and had risen about a foot. There were heavy showers at Fair Bluff, but they did not extend far into South Carolina. At Marion, S. C., there was no rain, and the crops are suffering, and in many places ruined by the long continued dry weather.

On the line of the W. & W. R. R. there were copious showers and at some places they were severe. At Burgaw, Pender county, the lightning struck the stable of Dr. W. T. Ennett, and killed a valuable horse which he had recently purchased. Singular to state, after death there was no mark visible showing that the horse had been killed in such a manner. This is all of the serious damage to life or property of which we have heard.

Yesterday (Sunday) there were frequent light showers at Charleston, S. C., Savannah, Ga., and other Southern cities extending along the ocean and gulf coasts as far as Mobile, Ala., while at Vicksburg, Memphis, Natchez and other points in the Mississippi Valley there were none.

### Accident.

Mr. Willie Reeves, while at work this morning with a gouging machine, at Messrs. Hart, Bailey & Co's machine shops, had the misfortune to cut one of his hands, inflicting a painful although not dangerous wound. The wound was on the fleshy part of the hand and thumb and will probably keep him from work for a few days.

### New Uniforms.

A new fire company composed of colored men has been organized on the North side of the railroad. It is named "Rescue, No. 1," and the members have supplied themselves with new uniforms, a sample of which was on exhibition at Heinsberger's book and music store to-day. It consists of a helmet shaped cap of black leather with "Rescue, No. 1," on a red ground bordered by white leather on the front, and double breasted red shirt with blue trimming. The uniform is neat, simple and very becoming.

### Accident.

Just as the citizens were rushing to the fire this noon, and while quite a throng were congregated on the corner of Market and Front streets, the sign on Miss E. Karrer's store, over the Front street entrance, suddenly fell on the head and shoulders of Daniel Rowan, though not inflicting any serious injury. In its descent the sign struck upon a show case suspended at the side of the door, which broke the force of the fall, otherwise Rowan's injuries must have been serious.

### Almost a Fire.

At about noon to-day a fire was discovered in one of the sheds of the rosin yard of Messrs. G. W. Williams & Co., on the opposite side of the river. The alarm was at once given, and the fire department were promptly at Market street dock, ready to be conveyed across, but the energetic work of those employed in the yard extinguished the flames and it was not necessary for the engines to cross. There was a brisk wind blowing at the time, and for a few moments it appeared that the conflagration would be general, but fortunately, the flames were gotten under control at once. The damage was very small.

### Envelopes and Postal Notes.

After the 1st of September the post-office department will begin to receive requisitions for the two cent stamped envelopes under the new schedule.—Postmasters are already receiving payments for "special request envelopes" of the new issue—that is, envelopes having printed thereon the name and address of the person or firm issuing them with a request to return if not delivered in a specified number of days. All orders received at the postoffice in this city for such envelopes, commencing Saturday, 1st proximo, will be forwarded to Washington by the next mail going North. As similar orders will be transmitted from all parts of the United States, it is expected that two or three weeks will be occupied in the first requisitions, but whenever received by postmasters there will be no delivery to the public until the morning of Monday, October 1st, at which time the new adhesive two cent and four cent stamps will be placed on sale.

After the 30th instant, no orders for three cent "special request envelopes" will be received unless the applicant files a written statement that the supply will be exhausted by the 1st October. It is presumed, however, that all who require three cent stamped envelopes to carry them through September, will buy them, as needed, at the postoffice.—The issue of "postal notes," payable to bearer, for all sums from one cent to four dollars and ninety-nine cents, inclusive, will begin Monday, September 3rd. On inquiry at the postoffice here, it is learned that money orders will continue as heretofore.

### The Colored Baptist Church.

Rev. A. M. Conway, pastor of the First Baptist Church, (colored) in this city, returned here Saturday night, after a trip North in the interest of his church. He secured, in all, contributions amounting to \$403, and of this amount \$153 was contributed in Wilmington. He desires to return thanks to those who have aided him, both here and elsewhere. He was not so successful as he hoped to be, because of the fact that so many who would have assisted him were absent at the Summer resorts. He expects to go North again in the Fall.

There was quite a washout by the storm of Saturday night on the Carolina Central Railroad, where it is crossed by the Fourth street bridge, but not so serious as to delay the moving of all the trains.

North Carolina hams, of which there are but very few in the city, were retailing from the stores to-day for 18 cents per pound.

There was a second alarm of fire this forenoon, from the Fifth Ward, but it was soon ascertained to be a false alarm.

The receipts of cotton at this port to-day foot up 3 bales.
