STATE NEWS.

Beaufort Telephone: Rev. T. A. Reid, who has been in charge of the Baptist Church in this place for some time less than a year, has determined to resign his pastoral charge and remove to some other locality.

Clinton Caucasian: The storm last week blew many birds from the far inland. One was picked up in our streets and we have heard of several others in the county.

Tarboro Guide: Prof. J. A. Duggan, of Williamson, has nearly completed a combination loading machine, in which he can decap, cap and load a shell in ten seconds.

News and Observer: Yesterday at the Centennial graded school 653 pupils were present.

It seems to be the general impression now that the cotton crop will be at least one fourth smaller than that of last year. The quality of the staple is quite good.
