There was one case of disorderly conduct before the Mayor this morning which was settled by the payment of a fine of \$2.

Rev. R. O. Burton, P. E., will preach at the Front Street M. E. Church to night, services commencing at 8 o'clock. It is hoped that a good congregation may be present.

Danish barque *Louise*, Capt. Hansen, cleared to day for Antwerp with 2,352 casks spirits turpentine, valued at \$47,397, shipped by Messrs D. R. Murchison & Co.

The new plate glasses for the windows of Mr. Julius Samson's store, on Market street, have not yet arrived but are expected to-morrow, and will be placed in position at once.

The card of D. W. Evans appears in this issue in which he informs his former patrons where he may now be found, and where we doubt not they will be glad to avail themselves of his services.

With one or two exceptions all of the places of business of our Jewish fellow citizens have been closed to day to reopen at sunset this evening. On the South side of Market street, between Front and Second, there are 16 stores and of these 9 were closed to-day.

Mr. A. W. Rivenbark is now permanently established at No. 116 North Water street, where he will devote his personal attention to all business matters entrusted to him. He has had many years of experience in the business and is prompt, energetic and reliable and in every way worthy of success.

The New York *World* publishes a list of nearly 400 persons resident in that city who can control \$1,000,000 each. Among the number is the name of Col. Kenneth M. Murchison. The exact rating is not given, but Col. Murchison is probably worth considerably more than a million.

Criminal Court.
 The proceedings before this tribunal to-day consisted in the trial of James Freeman, colored, charged with larceny. The case was given to the jury after which the Court took a recess until 3 o'clock this afternoon. The verdict had not been rendered when our report closed.

Prof. Zera Semon.
 Prof. Semon will give another of his splendid entertainments at the Opera House to night, in which the programme will be varied, interesting and truly wonderful in its execution. The feat of suspending his little child in mid air over the stage will be one of the wonderful things that may be witnessed to-night.

Lively Work.
 The steamship *Raleigh* arrived at her wharf from Baltimore on Sunday morning and commenced work discharging cargo at 12:30 yesterday morning. She had a larger freight than she had on her first visit here, which she discharged and took in a full freight, even to a deck load, and sailed this morning.

Eclipses During October.
 During the present month there will be two eclipses, one of the moon and the other of the sun. That of the moon will take place at two minutes after 1 o'clock, a. m., the 16th and will be visible in the United States and on the Pacific coast. The eclipse will last about one hour and fifty-two minutes, and only about 8-100ths of the moon will be obscured. The phenomenon is remarkable for being the only lunar eclipse visible in this latitude during the year.

An annual eclipse of the sun will take place on the 30th, visible on the Pacific ocean and partly on the Pacific coast. As the ring of sunlight surrounding the moon's dark disk will be invisible here, the event is of little importance.

Board of Alderman.

The Board met in regular session yesterday afternoon.

The Finance Committee reported a resolution, which was adopted, that the Board of Audit and Finance concurring paragraph 80, section 12, class I, of the Tax Ordinance, be amended so as to read: "Sixty dollars per annum or less time."

The Police Committee reported bids from A. David, L. J. Otterbourg and A. & I. Shrier, for uniforms, according to advertisement, when Alderman DeRosset moved that the matter be referred back to the committee with instructions to get frock coats of grey cloth, to be selected by the committee. Adopted.

Alderman Chadbourne moved that the committee on Police be authorized to receive and open the bids and award the same to the lowest bidder. Adopted.

Alderman Fishblate asked to be excused from serving on the committee in this matter, when Alderman Boney was appointed in his stead.

Resignation of D. S. Bender as police man was read and accepted.

The Police Committee offered the following, which was adopted:
 Resolved, That H. Woebse, now acting as Health Officer, be transferred to the regular police force, and that W. M. Hays be made the Health Officer vice H. Woebse, transferred.

Alderman Fishblate offered a resolution that all charges made against a member of the police force shall be immediately investigated by the Mayor and committee on Police, who may suspend or discharge the accused, he having the right to appeal to the Board of Alderman. Adopted.

In the matter of the obstruction of Campbell street, between Second and Third, a report of the Chief of Police and a communication from Capt. John F. Divine were read.

Alderman Chadbourne moved that the matter be indefinitely postponed, which motion was adopted.

Committee on the Department recommended the petition of Hood & Ladder Company No. 1, for an addition to their stables and for a new set of harness, which was adopted.

Committee on Fire Department reported on the matter of reducing the fire limits, asking for further time, which was granted.

Recommendation of the committee on Fire Department, that the Chief of Police reestablish the old fire alarm system and instruct the policemen on duty to ring the various alarms in their respective districts, and to also continue the present electric alarm service, was adopted.

Petition of McDougall & Bowden, for permission to erect a shed with tin roof on their premises, was granted.

The committee on Lights reported, recommending that a gas lamp be placed on the north side of Walnut, between Second and Third streets; oil lamps on the north side of Hanover, between Second and Third streets; on Eighth and Queen streets on the corner designated by the Chief of Police; and that gas lamps be substituted for the oil lamps now standing on the corner of Sixth and Church streets, and one at the corner of Sixth and Castle streets; and an oil lamp on the southeast corner of Anderson and Queen streets.

Petition from the Library Association for a light in front of the Library rooms, was not granted.

Alderman Dudley offered resolutions that section 4 of Market ordinance be amended so as to read in the 9th line "and between the hours of three (3) and eight (8) in the afternoon," and that the Committee on Market and Fees be authorized to make necessary alterations in the Fourth Street Market House to make it more habitable. Adopted.

Alderman Fishblate moved that the Committee on Lights report on the matter of electric lights at an adjourned meeting.

Alderman Boney offered a petition of sundry merchants, to amend the market regulations so as to allow them to sell dressed poultry from their respective stores. Referred to the Committee on Markets, to report an amendment if deemed advisable.

Proposition of Capt. Edgar G. Williams, of the steam tug *Wm. Nyce*, to be in readiness in all cases of fire on the water front of the city, or on the opposite side of the river, to tow lighters with fire engines across the river, etc., for such a sum as may be agreed upon, with recommendation of Capt. C. D. Myers, Chief of the Fire Department, was referred to the Committee on Fire Department.

On motion of Alderman Geyer, the Board adjourned until 8 o'clock, Friday night.

Rosh Hashanah.
 The Jewish New Year was appropriately observe to day, by a total cessation from business on the part of our Jewish citizens and by services in the Temple, conducted by Rev. Dr. Mendelsohn. The stores were closed at sunset last evening and will be generally reopened at 8 o'clock this afternoon.

Historical and Scientific Society.
 There was quite a large and enthusiastic meeting of the above named society at Tienken Hall last night, although many of its members are yet absent from the city. Mr. D. Casswell read a paper on science in its relations to family life, and claimed that pure religion was the highest form of science. It was a carefully prepared paper, and was placed with the archives of the Society. We are glad to learn that quite valuable contributions to the Society's collection of books, &c., were recorded, and also glad that the encouraging presence of a number of ladies added to the interest of the meeting.

County Commissioners.
 The Board of County Commissioners met yesterday afternoon.

The County Treasurer's report for September showed a balance on hand to the credit of the General Fund of \$3,344.40, and a certificate of deposit for \$6,500. Eight coupons of the denomination of \$3 each were exhibited and burned in the presence of the Board. The Educational Fund shows a balance on hand of \$11,742.34.

The County Register submitted his report for the month of September, showing fees received for marriage licenses, amounting to \$7.60.

John H. Savage's poll tax was ordered to be remitted for the township of Wilmington, he having listed also in Cape Fear township.

Owen Burney's poll tax was remitted; he being over age.

Isaac H. White was allowed to list his taxes for 1883.

The double tax assessed against John F. Garrell in Cape Fear township was ordered remitted; he being allowed to furnish a correct list.

J. D. Sellers' poll tax was remitted on account of over age.

J. T. Kerr, whose poll was listed both in Cape Fear and Harnett townships, had the matter corrected.
