At sunset to-morrow afternoon Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement in the Jewish religion, begins, to continue until sunset on Thursday. This is the most solemn day of the year with the Jews, and is a rigorous fast, during which they condone their sins and shortcomings of the previous year. The day will be strictly observed by our Hebrew friends in this city. There will be services to-morrow evening on the Temple and again on Thursday, morning and afternoon.

The attendance from this city at the Baptist Association, which convenes to-morrow at Still Bluff, in Pender county, will be a large one. The steamer *John Dawson* took up this morning a goodly number, roughly estimated at about one hundred, and others will probably go up to-morrow and Thursday.

Newbern and Wilmington.

Mr. Matt Manly, of Newbern, in a card published in the *Journal*, claims that the Newbern market for cotton is not properly quoted, because of improper classification. Mr. Manly says:

We still have as formerly the highest market in North Carolina, except Wilmington, and better than Wilmington when the charges are considered.

Cotton is quoted on Saturday fast in Newbern, in the commercial columns of the *Journal*, at 9 1/2 cents for middling, which Mr. Manly claims should have been 9 13-16. On the same day it was officially quoted here at 10 1/2 cents for middling, at which price nearly a thousand bales were sold. Here is a difference of 5-16 in favor of this market, at Mr. Manly's own figures, for that gentleman to work on.

Education at Teachey's.

A correspondent at Teachey's, in Duplin county, tells us that the good people of that section are awaking to the needs and necessities of educational benefits in their midst. They have secured the services of Mr. Douglas McMillan, Jr., of Pender county, who is well-known as an accomplished scholar, and we are glad to know that his school opens with fine prospects.

The people are still further forwarding the cause of popular education by instituting a system of public lectures at the Academy, during the Winter.—These lectures will be delivered free and by competent gentlemen, upon educational subjects. Nothing is more improving to a community than for the citizens of it to listen to entertaining lectures during the long Winter evenings upon popular science and education. Mr. McMillan will lecture at the Academy on the afternoon of the 12th inst., at 4 o'clock. The public are invited to attend.

A Horse Thief on his Travels.

W. H. Swain, who it will be remembered was convicted in the Criminal Court of New Hanover, some years ago, and sent to the Penitentiary, has again been heard of as a law-breaker. He served out his term of three years and this is the first time, it seems, that he has been heard of since his release. Sheriff Taylor, of Brunswick, writes us that he received papers from the Sheriff of Colleton county, S. C., for the arrest of one W. H. Swain, who is charged with having stolen a mule from some one in that county, and was supposed to have made his way to this State. On last Tuesday night it seems that he also stole a large bay horse from Mr. David Flowers, of Bladen county, and from Mr. Flowers' place he went down into Brunswick among the cow thieves in Snowfield. It was on Wednesday he appeared there and on Thursday he left his horse and walked off down near Shallotte and put up Tuesday night at the Dew place, in Lockwood's Folly township, on the Georgetown road. There he learned that parties from Bladen were after him and that they had pushed on towards South Carolina. He left that neighborhood before day on Friday morning and walked back that night to where he had left the horse and has succeeded in flanking all who were in pursuit of him. Sheriff Taylor thinks that he has either passed through this city and gone East, on that he has made his way up towards Cumberland county, possibly returning to South Carolina.

Swain is the same individual who was tried in Brunswick in 1883, for the murder of a colored man named Cobb, near Phoenix, on the C. C. R. R., and was acquitted. If he is caught this time he will probably make the acquaintance of Judge Lynch.
