He estimates from all he has been able to see and hear that the ipeanut crop in Pender is very good and that corn and cotton, on the whole, will exceed somewhat the recent estimates of a half crop. In Onslow, in the Richland and Lake Catharine sections, the yield of both corn and cotton will be good, probably up to the average, while further down, about Jacksonville, neither crop will realize more than two thirds or perhaps three fourths. Our informant says that there has been an improvement in Duplin county and that as well as he is able to estimate there will be about one-half of a crop of corn and two thirds of a crop of cotton made there. In Sampson, howeyer, the output is worse than it is in Duplin, and the best that the farmers in that county claim is one-half of a crop of corn and cotton. In Johnston will make there an average crop. The improvement has been due to the beautiful weather with which we have been so signally favored during nearly all of the past four weeks.
