There was a large fire in Savannah vesterday and 300 bales of cotton were burned and several lives lost. The particulars are not yet at hand.

Butler in Massachusetts.

In the big fire at Charleston, on Mon day, 2,145 bales of cotton were burned, the total value of which was \$107,250. It was all fully covered by insurance.


