General Sherman arrived in St. Louis on Monday. Prince Bismarck is again suffering from jaundice and a cold.

Gladstone is about entering on his fifty-second year in the English Parliament. Official returns from every county in New Jersey give Abbott's majority as 6,876.

Henry Ward Beecher will preside at a free trade meeting in New York on the 23d instant. "Uncle" Jesse McTeer saw the battle of King's Mountain and lived a century longer to die in Marysville, Tenn., the other day, aged 110 years.

An injunction has been obtained in New York against the Northern Pacific railroad company, to prevent the issue of \$20,000,000 second mortgage bonds.

Peter C. Smith, the New Jersey horse thief, began the 35th day of his self imposed fast yesterday. He is very weak, and occasionally stumbles and falls.

Miss Bennie Jones is the editor of a wild Democratic newspaper at Athens, O., but she is described as "the wittiest and brightest girl that can be found between the rising and the setting of the sun."

An agent of Bennett's cable has been examining the shore at Rockport, Mass., and stated that it has been decided to locate the terminus there at a spot called Loblolly, at the South end of the town.

The Boston Post thus speaks of the New York election: "It is a splendid victory which the New York Democrats have won, however, only marred by the uncalculated and reprehensible defeat of Judge Maynard."

The charge has been made that Mr. Samuel J. Tilden defeated Gov. Butler in Massachusetts, but the New York Times says "it is hardly fair to cheat the independent voters of Massachusetts out of the renown of having defeated Butler. We may allow that Mr. Tilden is a very great man indeed, but he did not defeat Butler."

In a part of the country where the long drought has been prevailing, one of the newspapers in speaking of a rain that had fallen the previous day, remarked that "while the showers were copious, they were not sufficient to meet the wants of the mill men," but the compositor made it appear "milkmen."

Senator Colquitt, of Georgia, says that he is satisfied from conversation with Democrats from all parts of the country that the only thing for the Democrats to do is to nominate "the old ticket," Tilden and Hendricks. Tilden, he thinks, can reclaim New York and Connecticut and carry the country. Senator Colquitt thinks that the "old ticket" will be nominated by a practically unanimous vote.

Mr. Geo. M. Carr of the Scotland Neck Commonwealth and Mr. E. A. Oldham of the State Chronicle and Winston Sentinel are in the city. Preparatory to moving into their new offices the Carolina Central Railroad Company were having their large iron safe lowered from the Murchison Building this morning.

The parsonage of the Second Presbyterian Church on the corner of Fourth and Campbell streets is being handsomely fitted up for occupancy by the pastor, Rev. C. M. Payne. The furniture to be used in the presentation of Esmeralda, at the Opera House to-night will be from the establishment of Mr. T. C. Wilmington Presbytery.

Presbytery met at 9 o'clock this morning, pursuant to adjournment, and opened with prayer. The minutes of yesterday were read and approved. Committee on Bills and Overtures reported that nothing had come before them and, on motion, they were discharged.

Committee on Systematic Benevolence submitted their report, which, on motion, was approved and a copy ordered to be forwarded to Synod. Committee on Sessional Records submitted their report and recommended the approval of the records of Brown Marsh. On motion, the committee were discharged.

The unfinished business—the consideration of Overtures sent down by the General Assembly. On motion the consideration of Overtures, Nos. 4 and 5, was postponed until the Spring meeting of Presbytery. On motion, Rev. C. Shaw was granted permission to labor outside the bounds of Presbytery for six months. Special Order of the Day—the examination of Mr. Phillips, on Theology was taken up, and, on motion, this part of his trial was sustained. He was then examined on Ecclesiastical History, Sacraments and church government, and, on motion, those were sustained as satisfactory parts of his trial.

Revs. Primrose, Sumney, Summerell, Allison and Ruling Elder, Col. Hunter, of Orange Presbytery, Winn and Arnwood, of Concord Presbytery, and Burton, of Mecklenburg, being present, were invited to sit, as corresponding members. On motion, the trial sermon of Mr. Phillips was made the first order of the day this afternoon. The committee to select the place of the next meeting of Presbytery submitted their report. Clinton, Sampson county, was selected as the place, and the Wednesday night before the third Sunday in April as the time for its meeting. Report of special committee on Home Missions was, on motion, made the second order of the day this afternoon. Committee appointed to install Rev. J. M. Rose submitted their report. Committee on Minutes of General Assembly submitted their report, which was approved. Committee to install Rev. A. M. Fadyen submitted their report. Rev. A. Kirkland, Commissioner to General Assembly, submitted his report. Commissioner to Orange Presbytery submitted his report, which was accepted.

Revs. B. F. Marable and S. H. Isler, and Ruling Elder Henry Farris were appointed committee on Overture No. 4, and Revs. J. R. Wilson, D. D., and C. M. Payne, and Ruling Elder C. H. Robinson were appointed committee on Overture No. 5. Report of Trustees of Davidson College was read and ordered filed. Rev. C. M. Payne and J. M. Rose were elected trustees of Davidson College. Presbytery reconsidered its action as to the first order of the day this afternoon, and proceeded to hear the trial sermon of Mr. Phillips. On motion, Presbytery instructed the Treasurer to pay for the publication of the Manual of Presbytery. The Treasurer was ordered to pay Rev. Kenneth McDougal the amount of \$50 out of the Sustentation Fund. The Treasurer was instructed to pay the assessment of the General Assembly and Synod's assessment. Presbytery heard the trial sermon of Mr. Phillips and sustained it as a satisfactory part of his trial, and, on motion, his examination was sustained as a whole and Presbytery proceeded to his licensure.

The election of the Committee on Home Missions was placed on the docket until the Spring Meeting of Presbytery. Special Committee on Home Missions submitted report, which was received and adopted. Committee on Narrative submitted report. Committee on Leave of Absence submitted report and were discharged. The Presbytery took a recess until 3 o'clock this afternoon.
