Major Nickerson writes to an army officer in Washington that he will shortly return to that city.

There are 18,600 stockholders in the Panama Canal, and every new loan is absorbed at once. In fact, the demand exceeds the supply.

Louisville is greatly tickled with the success of its exposition, and wants another next year, timed so as to end before the cotton show in New Orleans begins.

It is one of the things which no one can explain that the financial reports from New York, Boston, London and Paris all speak of a depreciation in the market value of stocks without any apparent cause.

RAILROAD MEETINGS.

Annual Meetings of the Stockholders of the Wilmington, Columbia & Augusta R. R. and the Wilmington & Weldon R. R.

WILMINGTON, COLUMBIA & AUGUSTA RAILROAD.

The regular annual meeting of the stockholders of the Wilmington, Columbia & Augusta Railroad convened at the office of the Secretary at 9 o'clock this morning.

Col. H. B. Short was appointed Chairman and Mr. J. W. Thompson, Secretary of the meeting.

Messrs B. F. Newcomer and George C. Jenkins, with the Secretary, were appointed a committee to verify proxies, who reported 6,908 shares represented in person and by proxy.

The meeting was then declared duly organized.

The President, Hon. R. R. Bridgers, then read his annual report which was received and adopted.

The reports of the Superintendent, Treasurer and Auditor were submitted and ordered printed with the published proceedings.

The meeting then proceeded to elect a President, which resulted in the unanimous election of Hon. R. R. Bridgers.

The following gentlemen were then unanimously elected a Board of Directors: Messrs W. T. Walters, S. M. Shoemaker, B. F. Newcomer, George C. Jenkins, Enoch Pratt, H. Walters, George S. Brown, H. B. Plant, R. R. Bridgers and H. B. Short.

The meeting then adjourned, to meet again in this city on the Tuesday next after the third Monday in November, 1884.

WILMINGTON & WELDON R. R.

At 11 o'clock this forenoon the regular annual meeting of the stockholders of the Wilmington & Weldon Railroad was held at the office of the Secretary in this city. Mr. H. B. Short was made President of the meeting and Mr. J. W. Thompson Secretary. Mr. Thompson and Mr. B. F. Newcomer were elected a committee to verify proxies, who reported 17,658 shares represented in person and by proxy.

The chair then announced that a majority of the stock was represented and the meeting duly organized.

The President, Hon. R. R. Bridgers, then read his annual report, which was concise, and comprehensive and showed the business of the road to be in a flourishing condition.

The reading of the reports of the Superintendent, Treasurer and Auditor was dispensed with and the reports of the President and Superintendent were received and adopted.

The report of the Auditing Committee was then read and received and adopted.

The President then made a statement of progress in relation to the proposed cut-off from Wilson to the South Carolina line.

Mr. B. F. Newcomer, as a representative of stock owned outside of the State, originally favored the movement, but since the hostile legislation of Georgia and South Carolina, and the attempted legislation of North Carolina he had come to the conclusion not to urge the matter; that the stockholders be represented did not feel like investing their capital in an enterprise over which they could have no positive control.

Discussion followed, which was participated in by President Bridgers, Mr. Newcomer, Judge Howard and Mr. Branch.

Mr. Donald McRae then introduced the following:

In view of the evils which have grown out of the legislation of some of the Southern States, whereby stockholders have been practically deprived of the management of their own railroads, and of the dangerous agitation of the same subject in North Carolina:

Resolved—That all consideration of the subject of constructing a branch road from the Wilmington and Weldon Road, in the direction of Florence, be for the present postponed.

The resolution was adopted.

The meeting then proceeded to the election of a President and Mr. J. W.

Thompson was elected to count the ballot. Hon. R. R. Bridgers received all the votes and was declared elected.

The meeting then proceeded to the election of a Board of ten Directors. The following were elected to serve for the ensuing year: W. T. Walters, B. F. Newcomer, S. M. Shoemaker, H. B. Plant, H. Walters, A. J. DeRosset, E. B. Borden, W. H. Willard, George Howard.

Col. John W. Atkinson and Messrs. A. Branch and B. G. Worth were then elected Auditing Committee for the ensuing year.

Meeting then adjourned to meet again in this city on the Tuesday after the third Monday in November, 1884.

MEETING OF DIRECTORS.
Immediately after adjournment a meeting of the Board of Directors was held and Mr. B. F. Newcomer was elected Vice President and Mr. J. W. Thompson Secretary and Treasurer of the Company for the ensuing year. A semi-annual dividend of 4 per cent. was declared payable on the 15th of January next.

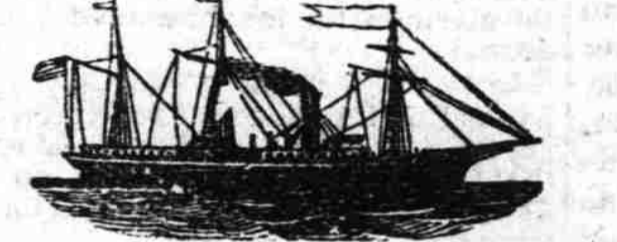
