It has increased in brilliancy since October, and will probably reach its maximum by January 12. when it will be as bright as a star of the third magnitude.



Arrived Leaking.

The German brig Hermann Fredricks, Capt. Neijahr, which arrived last night from Liverpool, had a very serious time while off our coast. On Saturday last, on the Gulf Stream, she encounter ed a heavy gale of wind, and Saturday night she commenced leaking badly which called 'all hands to the pumps. Notwithstanding the efforts of the crew the leak continued to gain upon them and they had about given up in despair when the crew of the pilot booat Uriah Timmons boarded them, on Thursday morning, and assisted them in bringing the vessel into port. The brig leaked at the the rate of about a foot per hour, and to keep her from sinking the crew had been kept continually at the pumps more than four days, and they were completely ex. hansted when relief came.


